DUBBS—George H. Dubbs, a Civil War veteran, and native of Penns Valley, died Friday in Holts Hollow, near Unionville, at the advanced age of 85 years, 5 months and 13 days. He was a lumberman and later a farmer by occupation. Interment was made at Centre Hall, Monday afternoon. A squad from Troop I, 103rd Cavalry, known also as Roal Troop, attended the services at the grave and fired the customary salute.

The deceased was a son of Jeremiah and Eliza J. (Reynolds) Dubbs. He was born at Gregg Station, west of Centre Hall, and was the last living member of the family. He was twice married. The first wife was Miss Annie Nicodemus, now deceased, and the second, Miss Beattie Johnston, who survives, as do also nine of ten children. One son, James, was lost in the Miami disaster, a few years ago.

STINE—Allison William Stine, aged 71 years, passed away at the Centre County hospital, Saturday afternoon, with ulcerations of the stomach. He is survived by two sons and two daughters; also by two brothers, J. Ellis Stine, of Bellefonte, and Harvey, of State College. Burial was made in the Union cemetery, Bellefonte, Tuesday afternoon.

MUSSER—A stroke of paralysis proved fatal to Mrs. Agnes H. Musser, widow of the late Wm H. Musser, of Bellefonte, who passed away at her home. Mrs. Musser was 71 years of age and was born in Bellefonte. A daughter of George and Rebecca A. Zettle, both of whom preceded her to the grave. Surviving are three sons: Boyd, of Altoona; Francis, State College; and Lester, Bellefonte; these sisters also survive: Mrs. Clyde Thomas, State College; Mrs. Wm Grove, Lemont; Mrs. Jane Shuey, Balton City, Ill. Interment was made in the Union cemetery, Bellefonte.

KEMMERER—Mrs. Kathryn Kemmerer, of State College, died at the Centre County Hospital, aged 79 years. She was the mother of Mrs. Eugene Lederer, of State College, and had made her home with the Lederer family for the past twelve years. Mrs. Lederer was born and reared at State College and was one of the oldest citizens of that community. Her parents were John and Christina Decker Krumrine. Her husband, Wm. B. Kemmerer, died 23 years ago. Mrs. Lederer is the only surviving child, but these brothers and sisters survive: Adam, Krumrine, John Krumrine, Mrs. S. S. Gable and Mrs. Daniel Nettich, of State College; Sidney Krumrine, of Philadelphia, and Mrs. Israel Melanson, of Boston, Mass. Interment was made at Pine Hall.

MEYER—The death of Mrs. Bruce Meyer in the Centre County hospital, on Thursday, was a great shock to the residents of Spring Mills where she was a resident all her life. She became suddenly ill on Wednesday of last week and that evening was conveyed to the hospital in the institution's ambulance. She received immediate attention, but not many hours later succumbed to acute dilation of the heart. The body was taken from the hospital by Undertaker F. V. Goodhart to her home and prepared for burial. Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon; interment in the cemetery at Salem church below Penn Hall. Rev. S. F. Greenhoe had charge of the funeral services.

Deceased was a daughter of J. Orlis and Aida (Beaty) McCormick. The mother is deceased, but her father survives, as do also her husband and a brother, Bruce McCormick, of Sunbury, where the father lives, and a sister, Cora. One child was born to the union, but death claimed it.

WEAVER—The following account of the death of a former Aaronsburg resident is taken from the Akron, O., Beacon Journal: Elmer E. Weaver, 66, retired West Hill grocer and resident of Akron for more than 30 years, died at his home, 41 Rhodes Ave. Although he had been in failing health for some time, his death followed a sudden heart attack.

Mr. Weaver was a partner in the Weaver & Higgs grocery store on W. Market, near Valley St., for 25 years, retiring about a year ago. He leaves his widow, Ella, a daughter, Mrs. Kenneth Lawrence, of Brooklyn, N. Y., and a sister, Mrs. Annie Mensch, of Aaronsburg, Pa.

Hosterman, of Woodward, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Harry Zieme, at Johnstown, after an extended illness incidental to her advanced age. Deceased was born in Freeburg, Snyder county, Feb. 25, 1862, making her age 78 years, 8 months and 2 days. Her husband preceded in death by about 15 years. Surviving her are six sons and three daughters: Theodore, of Akron, O.; Willard, Oliver and Chas. of Buffalo, N. Y.; Wesley, of Woodfield, N. J.; Mrs. Harry Zieme, of Johnstown, and Mrs. Carl Goussman, of Clearfield. Also surviving are sixteen grandchildren, one great-grandchild and one sister, Mrs. Adam Corman, of Millhelm.

Funeral services were held from her late home last Thursday, with sermon in the Evangelical church at Woodward, the Rev. H. C. Kieffel officiating. Interment in Woodward cemetery.

HARRY RUHL IS HELD FOR MANSLAUGHTER

On Wednesday a charge of manslaughter was brought against Harry Ruhl, of Lewistown, who was responsible for the death of Richard Matthews, of Altoona, an account of which appears on the last page of this issue of the Reporter.

The charge was prepared by District Attorney John G. Lovv. Matthews had both legs broken, an injury on the head and bruises. He also suffered injuries causing internal hemorrhages.

The Ruhl car struck a parked car estimated to have been 50 to 150 feet below the point where the men were hit. Claim is made by him that this caused his car to swerve and get out of control.

BUILDING WATER PLANT AT SPRING MILLS

Local parties have formed a company to build a water plant at Spring Mills to supply water for domestic use in that thriving village. Application has been made for a charter, and a State permit to use the water has already been procured. The water is taken from springs on lands along Egg Hill owned by former sheriff A. B. Lee. Two reservoirs are contemplated, one of which is already completed. The dimensions of it are 26x38 feet, with a depth of six feet. A second reservoir will be built one hundred feet higher, which will furnish a water pressure of from seventy to eighty pounds, ample for fire protection.

Two thousand feet of the 4900 feet of four-inch pipe have been laid. A second section of 1500 feet of one and one-half inch pipe will be connected to the four-inch section, and smaller pipes will be used for service.

Heretofore the village has depended almost entirely on cisterns and wells for its water supply.
