FARM CALENDAR

TIMELY REMINDERS FROM PENNSYLVANIA STATE COLLEGE SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE

Feed Wheat to Cows—

Wheat makes a good dairy feed in amounts up to one-third of the entire grain mixture. It should be rolled or coarsely ground and mixed with bulky feeds such as bran and oats, in addition to enough protein feed to balance the ration.

Provide Ample Space—

Allow at least three square feet of floor space for each bird of the light breeds and four square feet for the heavy birds. Seven inches of roosting space are required for birds of light breeds and eight inches for the heavy breeds.

Study by Mail—

Correspondence courses in agriculture and home economics are offered free by the Pennsylvania State College. Write for a catalog to the director at State College and then select a few subjects for winter study.

House Farm Machines—

This is a good time to house any farm machinery which may still be exposed to the forces of rust and ruin. A little grease put on the running parts will prevent trouble when the implements are put into use next year.

Breeding Improves Yield—

Twenty-six cows in the Penn State herd in 1891 averaged 4801 pounds of milk. Last year 71 cows produced 5428 pounds each. Better breeding is primarily responsible for the increase.

Save Soil for Planting—

Boxes of leaf mold, rich garden soil, and sand may be placed in the basement now for use next spring when seeds are planted in flats and boxes.

Keep Farm Accounts—

A good farm record book accurately kept will enable a farmer to really know his business.

Feed Syrup to Bees—

Sugar syrup, made by dissolving two and one-half parts of sugar in one part of water, is a good food for bees.

HAGAN'S TROPHY PLAQUE.

Local Goodyear Tire Dealer Given Recognition for Splendid Sales During July and August.

Marcellus was ordered to fire, and the report of his gun put real life into the red beast, and off to the mountain he went. One of several other shots fired later brought him to the ground, and in a short time his carcass was hanging on a tree.
