ORPHANS' COURT SALE

By virtue of an order of the Orphans' Court of Centre County, made December 2nd, 1930, in the Estate of Flora O. Bairfoot, late of the Borough of Centre Hall, deceased, the undersigned will offer for sale at public outcry, on Church Street, in the Borough of Centre Hall, at or near Purpart Number One, hereinafter described, on SATURDAY, DECEMBER 27TH, A. D. 1930, at 2 o'clock P. M., all of the following SEVEN purparts or tracts of land, bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

PURPART NUMBER ONE: All that certain lot located in the North side of Church Street, beginning at a point on said Street, being the Southeast corner of Lot herein described and adjoining Lot of Marion MacMarrin; thence along said MacMarrin lot in a Northerly direction a distance of one hundred and sixty feet to other lands of Flora O. Bairfoot, deceased; thence along lands of same in a Westerly direction a distance of fifty feet to corner; thence in a Southerly direction along other lands of the said Flora O. Bairfoot, deceased; thence in a Westerly direction a distance of fifty feet to corner at lane or alley; thence in a Southerly direction a distance of 160 feet along said alley, and lands of said decedent, 160 feet to a point on the North side of Church street; thence in an Easterly direction along the North side of Church street, 50 feet to corner of Purpart Number One hereinabove described, being the place of beginning and being a rectangular lot of 50 feet in width and 160 feet in length.

PURPART NUMBER THREE: Beginning on the North side of Church street, at the Southwest corner of lot of L. J. Burris; thence along the Western side of said lot in a Northerly direction a distance of 160 feet; thence in a Westerly direction on a distance of 17 feet to the Northeast corner of lot now or late of John Krumrine; thence in a Southerly direction a distance of 160 feet to the Southeast corner of said Krumrine lot; and thence in an Easterly direction 25 feet to the corner of lot of the said L. J. Burris, being the place of beginning. The above be-

ing an alley between the properties of the said Burris and the said Krumrine lot.

PURPART NUMBER FOUR: Beginning on the North side of Church street, at corner of lands now or late of John Krumrine; thence in a Northerly direction 277 feet more or less to said Stahl; thence in an Easterly direction along lands of same a distance of 262 feet more or less, to corner; thence again along lands of same in a Southerly direction 260 feet more or less to corner; and thence along lands of same in an Easterly direction of 143 feet, more or less to corner and lands of said Stahl; thence in a Southerly direction a distance of 594 feet, more or less, to corner of lands now or late of the said L. J. Ross, South fifty-six and three-fourths degrees West, forty and one-tenth perches to a stone; thence by lands now or late of B. H. Arney, South thirty-four and one-half degrees East, eighty perches to a stone; thence by lands now or late of Mary A. Dinges, fifty-five and one-half degrees East, forty perches to the place of beginning, containing twenty Acres, neat measure.

PURPART NUMBER SIX: Beginning at a stone on Public Road and lands now or late of B. H. Arney; thence by said road, North 43 degrees East fourteen feet; thence by lands of said G. H.
