Mrs. Armstrong had been in apparent good health and up until Thursday had been visiting her son, Earl Armstrong, in Bellefonte, leaving on that day for Avis, to visit her daughter, Mrs. Bowers.

She was born along Egg Hill, east of Potters Mills, and was a daughter of John and Anna Brees Armstrong. Surviving are her husband and the following sons and daughters: Arthur Armstrong, of Salina, Oregon; W. L. Armstrong, of Buffalo, N. Y.; Robert, of Canton, Ohio; Mrs. Jesse Huff, of Clearfield; Mrs. H. C. Bowers, of Avis; and Earl R. Armstrong, of Bellefonte.

She is also survived by two sisters and one brother: Mrs. Sadie Lee, of Boalsburg; Mrs. Edward Confer, of Spring Mills; and J. Ralph Smetzler, of Potters Mills.

Funeral services were held at the Bowers home Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock with burial in the Cedar Hill cemetery at Cedar Springs. The deceased was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church.

FETTEROLF.—Homer F. Fetterolf, of Selingsgrove, died at the Pottsville hospital, after an operation for the removal of the appendix. Interment was made on Friday, at Selingsgrove. He was aged 37 years.

The deceased was a son of Rev. Foster (deceased) and Mary Fisher Fetterolf, of Selingsgrove, formerly of Spring Mills. He was engaged as a public school teacher in Wilkes-Barre, and was unmarried. He is survived by his mother and several sisters.

She was a member of the Reformed church at Rebersburg all her life. Funeral services were held from the late home on Monday following her death, the services being in charge of Rev. Arthur J. Miller.

Interment was made in the Lutheran-Reformed cemetery in Rebersburg.

MARRIAGE BUREAU BRIDE FAILS TO ARRIVE

A prospective bride failed to arrive here from Arkansas, the latter part of last week, but telegraphs it was due to illness of a young son. The much disappointed farmer was Charles A. FREE FUEL FOR NEEDY.

A program directed toward helping the unemployment situation and relieving distress in Pennsylvania was advanced this week by the Pennsylvania Department of Forests and Waters by authorizing forest officers to issue free wood permits on the State Forests to any person in need of fuelwood who cannot afford to buy it.

Forestry officials feel that the State forests of Pennsylvania which belong to the people of the Commonwealth, and now comprise more than 1,500,000 acres, offer opportunities for relief in many parts of the State.

Welfare and civic organizations may take advantage of this plan by getting in touch with the District Forester and arranging for some qualified person to do the cutting.

The Department is also planning its road building program for next year, and cutting of rights-of-way of roads to be constructed next year will be started immediately so that fuelwood may be obtained as a result of the cutting.
