

COURT NEWS.

[Reported by S. D. Gettig, Esq.]

Court convened Thursday morning for Domestic Relations court and the following cases were called and disposed of:

Comm. vs. Evelyn Fisher; prostitution. Defendant was committed to the House of the Good Shepherd at Reading.

Comm. vs. Charles Bernert; prosecution Julia Bernert. Charged with desertion and non support. Court ordered defendant to pay the sum of \$25.00 per month.

Comm. vs. Harry H. Cramer; desertion and non-support; prosecution, Mary A. Cramer. At the conclusion of the case the defendant was ordered to pay the sum of \$15 per month.

Comm. vs. Edward Friehofer, charged with the larceny of an automobile; prosecution, A. L. Spotts. Defendant pleaded guilty; sentence at future time.

Comm. vs. C. M. Corl, charged with issuing bad check; prosecution, George Beezer. Defendant pleaded guilty.

Comm. vs. James White, charged with running a gambling device; pleaded guilty and sentenced to pay the costs of a fine of \$100 and probation for period of one year.

Comm. vs. B. C. Cruectti, charged with violation of liquor laws. Defendant pleaded guilty and was sentenced to pay fine of \$100 and undergo probation for three years.

Comm. vs. Harry Barbo, charged with violation of liquor laws; defendant pleaded guilty and was sentenced to pay fine of \$50.

Comm. vs. Alfred Muhlollen, indicted for breaking and entering. The verdict of the jury was guilty on the second and third counts and was sentenced to pay the costs and not less than one and a half nor more than three years in the Allegheny County Work House.

Comm. vs. Samuel Cartwright; prosecution William Vail. The same facts and the same disposition as in the preceding case.

Comm. vs. Little Fagan, violation of the liquor laws. Defendant pleaded guilty and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 and not less than two nor more than four months in the Allegheny County Work House.

Comm. vs. Robert Huggill, violation of the liquor laws; prosecution, Edward Gustafson. Defendant pleaded guilty and sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 and not less than three or more than six months in the county jail.

Comm. vs. Edward Rhine, charged with rendering aid in forging check. The case was tried on Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning and at the close of the Comm's testimony the court directed a verdict of not guilty.

Comm. vs. Ira Stern charged with larceny of a drum with some oil. The case was tried on Tuesday and a verdict of not guilty was rendered.

Comm. vs. Elsie Taylor, prosecution, P. C. Frank; charged with aiding the escape of a prisoner in the hands of Mr. Frank. This case on trial Tuesday evening and Wednesday morning.

The grand jury reported the court house in fine condition on the inside, but recommended cleaning or painting on the outside.

The jail was again reported in a deplorable condition due largely to the exposed plumbing.

Justices of the Peace were scored for sending trivial cases to court, thereby unnecessarily increasing the expenses of the county.

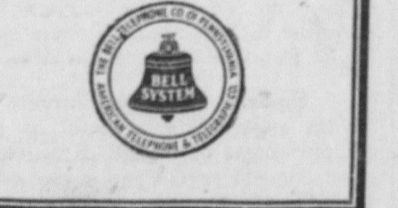
