FARM CALENDAR

TIMELY REMINDERS FROM PENNSYLVANIA STATE COLLEGE SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE

Seedlings Nearly Gone—

Nearly all the forest tree seedlings grown in the State nurseries have been allotted, according to Penn State foresters. The late application for some species, including Scotch pine and Norway spruce, will be held over until next spring.

Make Holes Large—

Dig large holes for plant material. It is a common practice to make the holes one foot wider and deeper than the roots of the material to be planted.

Care for Early Plants—

Avoid trouble by carefully regulating the temperature and moisture conditions for early plants. Water only on clear days and in the morning. Too frequent light applications of water cause damping off. Extreme high or low temperatures are dangerous.

Improve Pasture Sods—

Lime and fertilizer treatment on poor pasture sods should bring in white clover and the better grasses, thicken the turf, and greatly improve the quantity and quality of the grazing. Fertilization every five years and liming at longer intervals will maintain satisfactory production.

Keep Pigs Clean—

To grow a large number of thrifty pigs from the sows farrowing this spring, give them clean pens, clean lots and clean pastures in which to live.
