ROAD VIEWERS AWARD DAMAGE.

Fix Values of Claims of Owners Along Bellefonte-Milesburg Road, and Along Potters Mills-Tasseyville Road.

The Centre County Board of Road Viewers has awarded damages in five petitions involving property located along the recently improved highway between Bellefonte and Milesburg, as well as in a case along the proposed new highway near Potters Mills, following hearings recently.

In one petition, it is understood that John McCoy, of Bellefonte, sought damages aggregating \$13,000 from the county, but the viewers concluded that \$50 covered the damage to Mr. McCoy's property.

Other property owners along this stretch of road were rewarded as follows: Carrie Barnhart, \$700; John H. Wilson and wife, \$850; Mrs. John H. Barnhart and children, \$950; William A. Thomas, \$2,000.

The viewers also awarded Mrs. Geo. H. Emerick, of Potter township, \$1400 for damages to her property by the building of the road between Potters Mills and State College.

A hearing was also heard in the case of Annie Zelesnick, of Pleasant Gap, vs. the school district of Spring township in which the viewers awarded \$450.00.

According to J. Kennedy Johnston, chairman of the Board, each of the above petitioners as well as the county commissioners, have the right to take an appeal within thirty days when the merits of the case will be aired before a jury.

TIMELY REMINDERS FROM PENNSYLVANIA STATE COLLEGE SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE

Cows Need Much Water.

Dairy cows should have all the water they need to drink and have it when they want it. Drinking cups in the stable make this possible. Their cost often is repaid in a single season through increased milk production.

Plant Ornamentals Right.

In planting trees and shrubs, place top soil and sub-soil in separate piles. When filling in, apply the top soil about the roots and add commercial fertilizer or well-rotted manure if necessary.

Treat Grain for Smut.

Unless the seed is treated when smut infection has started in your grain, you are due to pay a heavy smut tax in lower yields and market discounts.

Five Steps to Success.

Good seed, thorough preparation of

the soil at the proper time, rotation of crops, use of lime as needed, and liberal fertilization are five sure stepping stones to profitable crop production.

Plan Garden Carefully.

Since the farm garden contributes a good share to the living of the farmer and his family, careful thought and attention to its planning and management is a paying investment.

Prepare Lambs for Market.

The market discriminates very se-

verely against male lambs that have not been castrated and against all lambs that have not been docked. These operations are simple and easy if performed while the lambs are young.

Convict Killer Hen.

Cannibal birds in the poultry flock can be detected by blood on the head or beak. If this evidence cannot be found drive the flocks slowly past a dead hen. The hen that picks at the dead bird convicts herself, say Penn State poultry specialists.
