The Athletic Association will hold a supper on March 28. Further notice will be published in the paper of 26th.

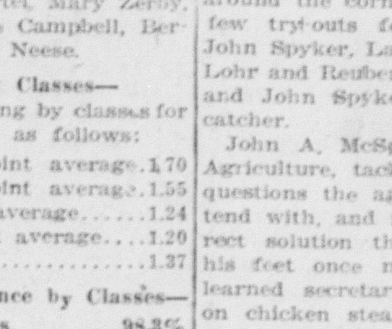
