
MILLER .-- Mrs. Mary Dale Miller died at her home at 217 South Burrowes street, State College, after an illness of five months, due to complication of diseases.

The body was brought to State College by an undertaker, and Tuesday morning funeral services were held from the home with interment at Millheim, Rev. J. F. Harkins, pastor of the Lutheran church of which denomination the deceased was a member, holding the services.

The deceased was a son of Adam and Nancy (Hennigh) Bartges and was born in Clinton county. His wife, who before marriage was Miss Mary Ilgin, survies him, as do also five of his seven children, namely: Carrie L., wife of Harry R. Wolfe, Centre Hall, R.
