**DEATHS.**

**DALE**—With the death of John Solomon Dale, on Friday, one of Centre county's most prominent members of the Grange organization passed to the beyond. On Wednesday previous to his death he became ill from flu, followed by a heart attack.

Funeral services were held from the home at 303 Fairmount Avenue, State College, on Monday forenoon, with Rev. J. F. Harkins of the Lutheran church in charge. Interment was made at Boalsburg.

Mr. Dale was twice married. The first wife, whose maiden name was Caroline Summy, died three years ago. There survive these children: Norman C Dale, county agent in Susquehanna county; Edwin H. Dale, principal of the Harris Township Vocational School, and Edith Mildred, wife of Roy W. Leinisch, Honesdale. The second wife, formerly Edith Sarkey, also survives the deceased. Willard Dale, of Bellefonte, is a surviving brother.

Mr. Dale beside being prominently connected with the various Grange projects in Centre county, was a representative of the State Workmen's Insurance Fund, a member of the State College Kiwanis club, a former justice of the peace, and a life-long member of the Lutheran church. He was aggressive in all his lines of work.

Deceased was born on the Dale homestead at Dale, Summit, College township, and was a son of George and Helena (Musser) Dale. He became sixty-six years of age on January 14th, last.

**BARTGES**—William David Bartges died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Eyrone Decker, at Edinburg, Lawrence county, Friday forenoon, from neuralgia of the heart. He and Mrs. Bartges had gone from their home in State College to visit the daughter about two weeks previous to his death. The body was brought to State College by an undertaker, and Tuesday morning funeral services were held from the home with interment at Millheim. Rev. J. F. Harkins, pastor of the Lutheran church of which denomination the deceased was a member, holding the services.

The deceased was a son of Adam and Nancy (Hennigh) Bartges and was born in Clinton county. His wife, who before marriage was Miss Mary Igin, survives him, as do also five of his seven children, namely: Carrie L., wife of Harry R. Wolfe, Centre Hall, R. D.; Jennie M., wife of Sterril Moyer, Jersey Shore; Anna N., wife of Eyrone Decker, at whose home the father died; Albert W., Farmingdale, Ohio, and Harry L., at home. Three brothers of the deceased are also living: Albert B. and Lloyd, Millheim, and Amrose, Royersford, Montgomery county.

Mr. Bartges followed farming until he retired nine years ago, at which time he moved to Centre Hall and after living here a year located in State College on 806 East Beaver Avenue. Mr. and Mrs. Bartges began house-keeping on the Hennigh farm, now owned by J. H. Detwiler, in Potter township. Later, about twenty-five years ago, the Hiram Durst farm, east of town, was purchased by them, and from there the family came to Centre Hall. He was a successful farmer, and believed in education, giving his children the benefit of a college or normal school training. He was aged 64 years, 2 months and 10 days.

**BITNER**—George H. Bitner died at his home in Milroy, on Friday, at the age of seventy-eight years. Interment was made on Monday at Milroy.

Mr. Bitner was a native of Potter township. He was a son of John and Sarah (Fredericks) Bitner, who came to Potter township from Lebanon county. The Rinnney farm, west of Tusseyville, was the Bitner homestead, and it was there the deceased was reared. After his marriage to Miss Sarah Meese he engaged in farming. Prior to leaving Penn's Valley he lived on the John Slack farm and from there moved to a farm in the vicinity of Sigerville. Later, on retiring from active farm life, he moved to Milroy, where his death occurred. He is survived by his wife and two sons, namely, John H., who lives in Milroy, and Jacob, at home. Two sisters—Mrs. Jacob Lee, Centre Hill, and Mrs. Emma Fohringel, of Colyer, also survive him.

**MILLER**—As a result of a severe attack of grip, Mrs. Charles Miller, of near Aaronsburg, died Friday night. Interment was made at Aaronsburg. The deceased was a daughter of Thomas and Anna (Stover) Stover, who survive her, as do also four children—Ray, Earl, Carl and Malin, and her husband. She was aged about thirty-five years.

**MILLER**—Mrs. Mary Dale Miller died at her home at 217 South Burrows street, State College, after an illness of five months, due to complication of diseases.

Mrs. Miller was the daughter of Philip S. and Sarah C. Dale, the latter passing away a number of years ago, and was born at Shiloh February 28, 1875. September 19, 1905, she was united in marriage to Newton B. Miller. To them was born one daughter, M. Ruth, who with her grandfather, Philip S. Dale, will continue to reside on South Burrows street. She had one brother, Owen L., now deceased. For a number of years she was a faithful member of the Lutheran church.

Funeral services were held by her pastor, Rev. J. F. Harkins, following which interment was made in the Boalsburg cemetery, beside the grave of her mother. The pall bearers were Messrs. Donald Musser, Bert Musser, Foster Musser, Edwin Dale, Hugh Dale and Ralph Dale.

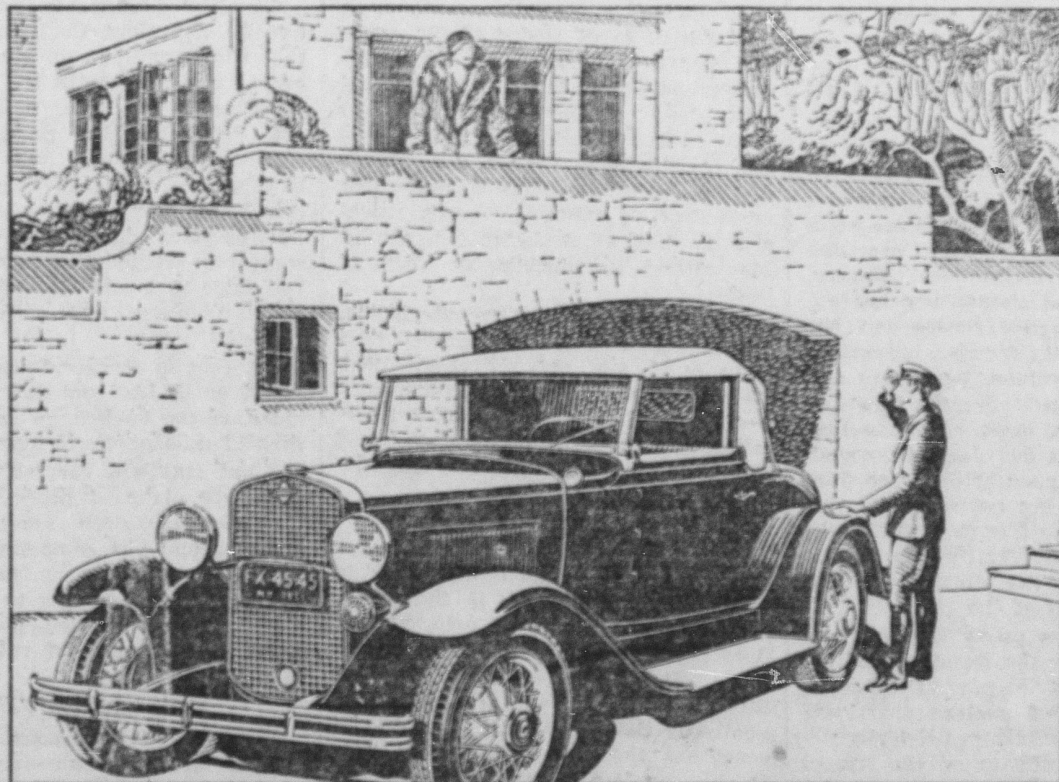
