FARM CALENDAR

TIMELY REMINDERS FROM PENNSYLVANIA STATE COLLEGE SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE

Gardening Is Popular—

Small gardens are going to play a large part this year in supplying the family larder with food in decreasing amounts on the income. Backyard gardens promise to be especially popular this year in piecing out the diet of the unemployed.

Feed Needy Bees—

Colonies which are short of supplies need food now for brood rearing. Sugar syrup, made by dissolving one and one-half parts of white granulated sugar in one part of hot water, is the most desirable food for spring feeding. The syrup is fed when cool.

Chicks Eat Early—

Feeding chicks 24 to 36 hours after hatching is no longer considered a harmful practice.

Prevent Horse Sickness—

Heavy feeding and no exercise on Sunday or rainy days are bad for horses. Be sure to reduce the feed when the work stock is idle.

Improve Old Lawns—

Old lawns should be gone over carefully at this time. Unsightly depressions which cannot be removed by rolling can be eliminated by lifting the sod, filling with good soil, and replacing the sod. Where this is not practical, fine loam can be spread to a depth of three inches over the existing lawn and the surface then seeded.

Fertilize Fruit Trees—

Weakened fruit buds will be aided by application of a fertilizer high in quickly available nitrogen, say Penn State fruit specialists.

Save Vegetable Plants—

Damping off of vegetable seedlings can be controlled by treating seed or soil with chemical solutions. Ask your county agent about this.
