B. D. Brisbin Celebrates 89th Birthday. B. D. Brisbin, on Sunday, quietly celebrated his eighty-ninth birthday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. George Robertson, in Hartford, Conn., where he is now living. Time has been dealing kindly with him, and his many friends wish him many more years here before the final taps. He is a Civil War veteran, having enlisted when a youth of twenty, when he was living with an uncle at Old Fort, in Co. G, 148th Regiment. While in action at Gettysburg, July 3, 1863, he was wounded, and June 22, 1864 while in an engagement before Petersburg he was made a prisoner. Later he rejoined his company and was discharged at the close of the conflict.
