DEATHS.

GARIS—Olive Susan Garis, widow
of Byron Garis, died at her home here
on Sunday afternoon, following a paralytic
stroke on Tuesday previous. The affliction
came upon her when walking through the
room, causing her to fall and break one of
the bones in her arm close to the wrist. She
became helpless at that time and never
recovered.

Funeral services were held Wednesday
forenoon and interment made by the side
of her husband, who died last July, in the
local cemetery. Services were conducted by
Rev. S. F. Greenhoe, of the Lutheran church.

Deceased was the daughter of John
and Mary (Mayes) Sweeney, and was born
at Sprucetown, February, 1858, making her
age a little over 73 years. The couple moved
to Centre Hall about forty-six years ago.

The surviving children are: Myrtle,
wife of W. H. Snyder, Potters Mills; Elsie,
wife of Wm. Wolf, Bellefonte; Lyde, wife of
J. L. Mowery, Burnham; Sheridan and Herbert,
at home; J. Reuben, Finleyville; John W.,
Bellefonte; William M., Milesburg, and Anna,
wife of Byron Auman, Smulton. William
Sweeney, Potters Mills, is a surviving brother,
and Mrs. Julia Gates, Stormstown, is a
surviving sister of the deceased.

SWABB—Luka M. Swabb, a former
resident of Centre county, died at his home
at Freedom, after an illness of three months
of complications.

Deceased was born at Tusseyville
fifty-two years ago. For the past 25 years
he has been an employe of the P. R. R. and
in five years would have been retired with
pension.

He was a faithful member of the
Methodist church in Freedom and was also
a member of the Brotherhood of Railroad
Trainmen. A kindly even-tempered
individual, he was well liked by his
associates.

Surviving are his widow, two children,
Lenore and Josie; a brother, Paul Swabb,
of Spring Mills, and two sisters, Mrs. Lenore
Burl of Millheim, and Mrs. (Ruth) Bower,
of Bellefonte.

Funeral services were held from his
late home and interment made at Freedom.

LANDSY—Marcus A. Lansdy, the
popular hotel man of Bellefonte, Wednesday
of last week was stricken with paralysis
while in the lobby of his hotel—the
Markland—and died a few hours later.

Mr. Lansdy came to Bellefonte in
1921, and up to a few months ago conducted
the Brockhoff House. A few years ago he
converted a large private dwelling into a
hotel with the most modern improvements
and enjoyed an extensive patronage.

Deceased was born in Germany about
68 years ago, the son of Marcus and
Ether Lansdy, and in 1923 he was united
in marriage to Miss Blanche Bailey, of
Philadelphia, who survives, together with
one sister and a brother, Mrs. Lipsky, of
New York City, and Leopold Lansdy, of
Detroit.

The body was taken to Philadelphia
where interment was made on Sunday.

GARNER—John C. Garner passed
away at the home of a daughter, Mrs. W. M.
Bottorf, in Bellefonte. He was a son of
Samuel and Anna Sellers Garner, who
came to Centre county from York county,
and was born near Boalsburg on January
25th, 1849, hence had reached the age of
82 years, 3 months and 9 days. The greater
part of his life was spent near State
College, where he engaged in farming until
his retirement some years ago.

As a young man, he married Miss
Mary Ann Stover, who died on October 15,
1895, but surviving him are five children,
Mrs. Bottorf, of Bellefonte; Miss Sue
Garner, a trained nurse in Philadelphia;
John Garner, of Dennison, Ohio; Isaac,
of Pittsburgh, and Harry, of Fort
Washington, Md. Interment was made
Thursday at Pine Hall.

S. GROVER WALKER
FOUND DEAD IN FIELD

Succumbs to Acute Dilation of the
Heart—Funeral Friday Morning
With Burial in Salem Cemetery.

S. Grover Walker, a well known
Gregg township citizen, was found
dead in one of his fields, between two
and three o'clock, Tuesday afternoon,
by one of a searching party formed on
his failing to return home after going
to the field to repair a fence. He was
found close to a railroad bridge over
Penns Creek lying face down, one
hand in his pocket clutching several
nails, and lower limbs crossed.

County Coroner Heaton viewed the
body, but declared death to have been
from the cause named above, consequently
no jury was empaneled.

Mr. Walker was aged 45 years, 6
months and 2 days. He was born in
Union county, a son of Isaac and Catharine
(Smith) Walker. He began life as a
public school teacher, then took up
farming. On establishing the First
National Bank of Spring Mills, he was
selected as cashier, and on retiring
from that position again began farming
a short distance west of Spring
Mills, where he lived to the close of
his life.

He is survived by a wife, nee Olive
Stover, and five children: Emma, a
Penn State graduate, teaching in Will-
iamsburg; William, also a Penn State
graduate, now taking a post graduate
course at Syracuse; Reed, who entered
Penn State last fall, but now at home;
June, a Gregg Twp. Vocational School
sophomore, and Bernice, an eighth
grade pupil.

There survive the deceased also these
brothers: M. G. and Irvin, Warriors
Mark; W. G., Tyrone; Ray, Freeport,
Ill.; and Foster, Plano, Ill., and Earl
Smith, Hollidaysburg, a half-brother.

Funeral services will be held and bur-
ial made in Salem Reformed cemetery,
Friday forenoon.

TATE—Thomas Tate, single, died in
Freeport, Ill. The body will be brought to
Bellefonte, accompanied by a brother,
George Tate, from where interment
will be made. The funeral will be in
charge of Undertaker Goodhart.

The deceased was a son of Jack
Tate, deceased, and was aged 76 years.
W. W. Tate, Bellefonte is also a brother
and Mrs. Edwin Smith, Centre Hall,
a sister of the deceased.

KNORR—John B. Knorr, of Read-
ing, died Monday at the age of 68
years. Funeral services will be held
Friday. He was well known through
this section where he traveled as a
shoe agent during the nineties. Later
he became a merchant and banker and
a foremost citizen of Reading. He is
survived by a wife, a son, Paul L.
Knorr of Reading and one sister, Mrs.
E. M. Huyett, of town.

SNYDER—Miles Elmer Snyder, aged
73 years, of Lewisburg, R. D. 4, dropped
over dead in a field on his farm fol-
lowing a heart attack, induced by over
exertion. He was dead before medical
assistance could be summoned.

Mr. Snyder was a native of Centre
county and had been a resident of
Union county for many years. He is
survived by his wife, two sons and
three daughters. Two brothers—John
Snyder, of Milton, and Ely Snyder, of
McEwensville, also survive.

Funeral services were held at his
home on Thursday with further ser-
vices at the Evangelical church at Ma-
zeppa. Interment was made in the
cemetery nearby.
