TEST 25,773 COWS

Seventy associations tested 25,773 cows during April. C. R. Gearhart, supervisor of testing for the Penna State College dairy extension service, reports, The herds were improved by the sale of 257 unprofitable cows.

Of the cows tested 4767 produced more than 49 lbs. of butterfat each and 5941 gave more than 1000 lbs. of milk apiece. There were 1696 cows in the 50-lb. butterfat group and 3552 cows in the 1200-lb. milk class.

STORM FORCES PLANE DOWN ON M. T. ZUBLER FARM

One of the Travel-Air passenger-carrying ships belonging to the Aeronautical Service Corporation of Erie, with C. R. Litzberger as pilot, was forced to land near Spring Mills, Wednesday afternoon, on account of fierce rain storms.

The plane circled about for a considerable time and then landed in a large wheat field belonging to T. M. Zubler. One of the passengers was Miss Rita Roeder, an invalid, who was being carried from Southern Pines, North Carolina, to Bradford.

She was accompanied by her brother, W. H. Roeder, an oil-well driller contractor, and a nurse.

The Centre County Hospital ambulance was called to convey the lady to the hospital, where she rested until the next morning, when the journey by plane was continued.

The plane landed without doing damage. It taxied across a field and over the highway to an alfalfa field, where the pilot took the air.
