About thirty years ago he and his wife, whose maiden name was Catherine Corman, located in Gregg township, having lived almost twenty years in the home where he died.

There survive the deceased a wife, and one daughter, Catharine, wife of William Hagan, of Penn Hall; also, a step-son, William Sinksabine, of Berryville, Virginia.

While working on the township roads last summer, Mr. Wise received a severe injury from a large stone falling from his foot. Later rheumatism and complications arose.

SOMETHING NEW.

Something out of the ordinary is planned for the coming session of the Central Pennsylvania conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church which will be held in Carlisle, June 16-22. WEST PENN AND BOROUGH IN NEW LIGHTING CONTRACT

The contract for street lighting by the West Penn Power company is about or has already expired, and a new contract was presented to the council for consideration. The new plan of lighting called for lights to be hung on arms from cedar poles, placed some distance outside the walk line. The council objected to poles being planted on the streets, and now it appears the lights will be carried in the same manner as at present. There will be some changes in the size of the lamps, and they will be replaced at stated times instead of when burned out. The new contract, it is claimed, will in some instances work to the benefit of the borough, while in others to the advantage of the light company, but in the final cost will be about the same to the taxpayers. Two additional lamps will be included in the new contract.
