FARM CALENDAR

TIMELY REMINDERS FROM PENNSYLVANIA STATE COLLEGE SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE

Why Sets Shoot Seed—
Causes or onions shooting to seed are planting large sets, high storage temperatures, unfavorable weather checking growth, and heredity.

Start Strawberries—
A strawberry runner plant developing and taking root in July will produce about four times as much fruit next year as one developing in September.

Control of Cucumber Pests—
Lead or calcium arsenate can be used in spray or dust to control striped cucumber beetles.

Feed Grain to Cows—
As pasture gets short, grain feeding to dairy cows should be increased gradually. Watch the daily production of milk and conditions of cows for indications of needs along this line say State College dairy specialists.

Paint Checked Wood—
Conspicuous wood checks or cracks show clearly that the wood is no longer receiving sufficient protection, even though the coating as a whole is apparently intact. If the wood is repaired promptly when wood check begins to appear, it can be protected indefinitely from weathering.

Merinos Make Profit—
Experiments at the Pennsylvania

State College show that native Merino lambs are as profitable as western lambs for feeding purposes when the value of the wool shorn from the Merinos is counted.

Make Hay Right—

Quality, weather, and yields must be considered in deciding the correct time to cut hay. The time differs from clover, timothy and alfalfa.

AN ORDINANCE

ORDINANCE NO. 29.

AN ORDINANCE authorizing and directing the Borough of Centre Hall, Centre County, Pennsylvania, to enter into and execute an agreement with the West Penn Power Company for lighting the streets, alleys, highways and public places of the said Borough of Centre Hall with electric light.

Section I. Be it ordained and enacted by the Borough of Centre Hall in council assembled, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same, that the said Borough enter into and execute an agreement with the West Penn Power Company in form set forth in Section II of this ordinance providing for the lighting of the streets, alleys, highways and public places of the said Borough.

Section II. "This agreement, made and entered into this 5th day of June, A. D. 1931, by and between the West Penn Power Company, hereinafter called "Producer," party of the first part, and the Borough of Centre Hall, Centre County, a Municipal Corporation of the State of Pennsylvania, hereinafter called "Consumer," party of the second part.

WITNESSETH, That in consideration of the payments, covenants and agreements hereinafter contained to be paid, kept and performed, it is mutually agreed between the parties hereto, their successors and assigns, as follows:

Paragraph 1. Producer agrees to light the streets alleys, highways and public places of said Consumer by its standard system of commercially rated incandescent street series lamps, or lamps of equivalent illuminating power, erected upon its system of overhead distribution lines, as herein specifically enumerated, or as may be ordered by the Consumer through its proper officials from time to time during the life of this agreement.

Paragraph 2. At or before the execution hereof, Consumer shall furnish Producer a list, certified by its engineer or other proper authorized agent, showing the locations and size of each and every lamp included in the number hereinafter specifically provided for. Producer agrees to locate said lamps at such locations as may be designated by the proper authorized agent of Consumer.

Paragraph 3. Producer agrees to relocate any lamps furnished under the terms of this agreement which do not require the extension of lines or erection of poles; however, Producer shall not be required to make more than one change in the location of any one lamp.

Paragraph 4. Producer shall not be required to extend its lines more than three hundred (300) feet for any additional lamp; nor be required to install any lamp within six (6) months preceding the expiration of this agreement.

Paragraph 5. Producer shall replace and repair the pavements and sidewalks of the streets and alleys wherever damaged in the erection and maintenance of its poles, wires, and other appliances, in as good condition as such pavements and sidewalks of the streets and alleys were in before the disturbance of the same by Producer.

Paragraph 6. Producer shall cause all of said lamps to burn continuously every night from dusk until dawn during the term of this agreement, but shall not be liable for damage to Consumer for any failure to keep said lamps lighted, resulting from accidents, strikes or causes beyond its control.

Paragraph 7. Producer agrees to maintain, clean and make such lamp renewals as are necessary to furnish the illumination provided for herein.

Paragraph 8. The rates at which Consumer shall pay Producer for lighting service to be furnished hereunder and the number of lamps of the respective sizes to be initially covered hereby shall be as follows:

... 2500 Candlepower lamps, each at \$150.00 per annum.
... 1500 Candlepower lamps, each at \$115.00 per annum.
... 1000 Candlepower lamps, each at \$90.00 per annum.
... 600 Candlepower lamps, each at \$65.00 per annum.
... 400 Candlepower lamps, each at \$50.00 per annum.

Seventeen (17) Candlepower lamps, each at \$25.00 per annum.
Nine (9) Candlepower lamps, each at \$20.00 per annum.
Payable in equal monthly installments.

Additional lamps will be furnished by Producer at said rates during the term of this agreement upon the proper written order of Consumer. The following block discounts will be allowed on monthly gross charges calculated from above rates in consideration of the five (5) year term for which this contract is made:

First \$100—Net.
Next 100—1%.
Next 100—2%.
Next 100—3%.
Next 100—4%.
Next 100—5%.
Next 100—6%.
Next 100—7%.
Next 100—8%.
Next 100—9%.
Next 100—10%.
Next 100—11%.
Next 100—12%.
Next 100—13%.
Next 100—14%.

All in excess of \$1500—15%.
Producer shall, upon written request of Consumer, change or install any of the lamps ordered, to lamps of a greater candlepower not to exceed any size adopted or used by Producer, and which shall be paid for at the rate adopted by Producer or as above set forth.

Paragraph 9. It is further agreed that Producer shall furnish to Consumer at any time during the term hereof, any other electric light or power service not exceeding ten (10) horsepower demand on any service connection, which may be furnished from Producer's then existing facilities, which Consumer may order in writing and which shall be paid for by Consumer in accordance with the rates, rules, regulations and form of contract on file with the Public Service Commission of Pennsylvania.

Paragraph 10. Producer shall render bills for each month's service on or before the 5th day thereof based upon

the number of lamps in service at the close of the preceding month. Charges for meters, service, additional lamps installed during any month and credits for outages shall be calculated and included in the statement rendered at the beginning of the month next following.

Bills are due and payable on the 15th of the month in which they are rendered.

Bills remaining unpaid on the fifteenth (15) of the month next following that during which the same are rendered shall bear interest at the rate of six (6) per centum per annum.

Paragraph 11. Consumer, by its authorized agent, shall notify Producer in writing at its local office of any and all outages and location of same not later than 12 o'clock noon on the day following the night upon which such outages occur.

A reasonable extension of time will be allowed for such notice to reach Producer's district office, in event of there being no office located within Consumer's boundaries.

Producer shall allow credit on gross bills before any discounts are applied for all outages so reported which exceed two consecutive hours. Said credit to be the pro rata amount of the gross rate based on 4,000 hours of burning per lamp per year.

Paragraph 12. It is hereby understood and agreed that neither the purpose, intent nor obligation of this contract, if and when approved by the Public Service Commission of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, is such as to impair or in any wise affect the exercise of said Commission of any of the powers vested in it by the Public Service Company Law, approved July 26, 1913.

Paragraph 13. This agreement shall be binding upon the parties hereto from and after the date of execution hereof, and shall continue in full force and effect for a period of five (5) years from the date on which at least fifty (50%) per centum of the street lighting service enumerated in Paragraph No. 8 hereof is first furnished.

Paragraph 14. All agreements or portions of agreements between the parties hereto inconsistent herewith are hereby cancelled, annulled, and made void in so far as the same conflict with the provisions hereof.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the parties hereto have caused this agreement to be executed in triplicate on the day and date first above written, done on the part of Producer by its President, Vice-President, or other authorized agent, attested by its Secretary or Assistant Secretary, and on the part of Consumer by its President of Council and Secretary in pursuance of an ordinance duly adopted on the 5th day of June, A. D. 1931, and approved by the Burgess on the 5th day of June, A. D. 1931.

Section III. Be it further ordained and enacted that the President of Council and Secretary of said Borough be and they are hereby authorized and directed to execute on behalf of said Borough said agreement with the said Company in form set forth in Section II of this ordinance.

That all ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance be and the same are hereby, repealed in so far as the same conflict with the provisions hereof.
