**SENATOR H. B. SCOTT
MAKES AN ADDRESS**

Speaks to the State College Kiwanis Club and Talks on Work of the Recent Legislature.

Senator Harry B. Scott of Philadelphia, was the speaker at the State College Kiwanis club one evening last week.

"In a lucid, forceful, and interesting manner," says the State College Times, "Senator Scott reviewed the work of the recent session of the State Legislature. On account of his position as chairman of the all important Appropriations committee, the Senator had an unusually good vantage point to analyze the public affairs of the State. He expressed his opinion in the controversy over the president pro tempore election, that no Senate should turn its back on the century-old tradition of re-electing the previous incumbent. He said he could see no good cause for failing to elect Senator Dalk." "Illustrating with maps and sketches he showed the great difficulties that were tied up when his committee on Congressional reapportionment attempted to do its work. He characterized the task of changing the State from 36 congressional districts to 34 districts, as one of the most difficult ones imposed on this legislature. He held to the principle that districts insofar as possible, should be compact and contiguous and should represent common interests.

"Other matters discussed by the Senator included the Public Service Commission and the fair rate bill as well as the township roads bill. The Senator closed by saying that of the 700 miles of township roads in Centre county, Highway Commissioner Lewis plans now call for the State assuming responsibility for over 200 miles of the seven hundred.

"Mr. Scott was brought before the club through the efforts of J. P. Aikens, of the public affairs committee of the club."
