PENN STATE COMPLETES FRESHMAN ENROLLMENT. With more than 1100 applicants of the 1225 offered admission in the freshman class of the Pennsylvania State College accepting through payment of the preliminary fee, enrollment for this group is virtually completed. Wm. S. Hoffman, registrar, reports. Copies of the Freshman Week bulletin are being mailed to these successful applicants this week together with instructions to report at the college September 17. During Freshman Week the new students will register, find living quarters and receive instruction and advice from the faculty members and upperclassmen.

The incoming class will represent the best-prepared group of students ever admitted as freshmen so far as the high ranking students are concerned, Mr. Hoffman says. Of the 1100 admitted, 1018 were graduated in the first two-fifths of their high school class. This number compares with 939 in the same group last year.

A slightly higher percentage of students graduated in the lower two-fifths of their high school class will be admitted, Mr. Hoffman says, because of the aptitude test taken by all applicants.

Will Preserve Stump of Pine 400 Years Old. A tractor was taken to the Hartach cabin near Carroll, Sugar Valley, recently, and the stump of a white pine tree, estimated to be 400 years old, was placed on a sled, which was attached to the tractor and hauled to a point west of the Hartach cabin, where it was placed, according to the request of Col. Henry W. Shoemaker, United States Minister to Bulgaria, in order to preserve it for study by future generations.

The tree stump is 5 feet 7 inches in diameter, and 14 feet in circumference, standing about five feet high.

About four years ago Col. Shoemaker found a valuable Indian pipe in a hollow about a foot from the top of the stump. It had evidently been placed on the top of the stump a century or so ago by an Indian brave while he reconnoitered, and had lain undisturbed until, as the stump decayed, it had been carried down into the heart of the tree, and was unnoticed by passers-by. Col. Shoemaker has the pipe in his large collection of antiques.

The public schools in Centre Hall borough opened on Monday with a total enrollment of 227 pupils. Of this number 192 are in the High school, and 125 in the grades.

LOCAL R. F. D. CARRIER COMPLETES 28 YEARS SERVICE

On Tuesday, W. F. Keller completed his twenty-eighth year in the rural delivery mail service, which service was continuously on Route No. 1 from the Centre Hall post office, the late Capt. G. M. Boal having been postmaster at that time. It was the only rural free delivery route from this office at that time, and was approximately twenty-four miles in length, covering a section immediately surrounding Centre Hall. There were but sixty boxes on the route then, and the average pieces of mail handled per month were 1900. A horse and the standard R. D. delivery wagon were used. The time for departure was 9:00 A. M., and return, 3:00 P. M. The salary then was \$50.00 per month. The single service from here continued until the Wilson administration came in, when a second route with Centre Hall as the center was laid out, which route continues today.

At this time Mr. Keller uses an automobile for delivery, covers thirty-four and a fraction miles, serves 155 box-holders, and the last count for a month showed that business had increased from 1900 pieces to 10,000 pieces of mail.

Through these years Mr. Keller rendered most satisfactory service to his patrons and the government.
