CRAWFORD.—Mrs. George Alfred Crawford passed away at her home in Centre Hall on Monday evening, after an illness of several months, from intestinal and bowel trouble. Funeral services were held from the home on Wednesday afternoon, in charge of Rev. J. F. Harkins, pastor of the State College Lutheran church, of which congregation she was a member. Rev. S. F. Greenhoe, pastor of the local Lutheran church, assisting. Interment was made in the cemetery here.

The deceased before marriage was Vera M., daughter of Henry E. Homan, deceased, and Mrs. Annie Homan, and was born November 9, 1892, making her age almost thirty-nine years. She was twice married, first to Chester E. Homan, from which union there survive two children, Warren C. and Annie Elizabeth, at home. The second marriage was to George Alfred Crawford, who survives, as does also a son, Edwin, about four years old.

The mother and these brothers and sisters also survive her: Miss Cora Homan, Centre Hall; Mrs. Lulu Reish, State College; John D. Homan, Pottery Mills, and Warren A. Homan, of Centre Hall.

HARTLEY.—A more complete account of the death of Clayton Hartley than that given in our issue of last week is reprinted from the Mifflinburg Telegraph:

Clayton Irvin Hartley, a patient sufferer for the past 15 years, was relieved of his suffering in the Gelsinger hospital at Danville, when death summoned him. He was aged 38 years, 3 months and 12 days.

Mr. Hartley was a baker by trade and when his health permitted he followed that trade in Millheim. When first married he lived in Mifflinburg for a number of years and was an employee at the silk mill. Moving to Millheim he followed the baking trade for three years when he was operated upon and his one kidney removed. Since then he had been unable to work. That was two years ago, when the family moved back to Mifflinburg. He is the father of five children. The mother worked and provided for the family during the father's illness.

Only two weeks after the couple were married, Mr. Hartley was taken ill and operated upon for gravel. Since that time he has been in the hospital nine times. The sympathy of the entire community is extended to the bereaved family.

Surviving other than his wife are the children, Donald, Ruth, Kenneth, Clayton, Jr., and Dorothy. All are at home with the exception of Ruth, who makes her home with her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Levi Hartley, at Centre Hall. A brother, Joseph Hartley, of Centre Hall, and a sister, Rhoda Giesner, of Erlola.

Funeral services were held in the Evangelical church Saturday, Rev. G. L. Reeser, pastor of the deceased, having charge, assisted by Rev. Dubs; interment at Mifflinburg.

SPEECE.—Mrs. Havana Speece, wife of Roy Speece, Lewistown, died at the Lewistown hospital, aged 34 years, 4 months and 2 days. Mrs. Speece became ill at the Bean Soup celebration at McClure, one week before her death. She was taken to the hospital where she underwent a serious surgical operation.

400-BUSHEL POTATO MEMBER IN CENTRE COUNTY

Membership in the State 400-bushel potato club is an honor achieved by L. E. Hess of Phillipsburg, according to County Agent R. C. Blaney.

Membership in this club is confined to potato growers producing 400 bushels or more of potatoes on a measured acre. The acre checked on Mr. Hess' farm produced 412 bushels. There were 14 acres of potatoes grown on the farm of the Russett variety planted on the 20th day of May. The vines died on September 16th and were sprayed eight times under 300 lbs. pressure. The field was cultivated twice and weeded seven times. 800 pounds of 8-16-14 fertilizer was applied in the row. The crop was grown on a field where rye had been plowed down as a green manure crop.

This makes a total membership for Centre county of eight. However, Mr. Hess is the only one to become a member during the past year.
