DEATHS.

MISHLER.—Frank Mishler died in Johnstown on Sunday from dropsy and complications at the age of between 63 and 64 years. The remains were shipped to Bellefonte at which place they were taken in charge by Funeral Director F. V. Goodhart and conveyed to the Spruce cemetery, east of Spring Mills for interment on Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Mishler has no relatives in this section, but there are four surviving brothers, three in Johnstown, and one in Ohio. There are no children. Mrs. Maggie Ockerman, a sister of O. E. Ockerman, of Gregg township, died a year ago and was also buried in the cemetery named.

The deceased was an iron worker and was on the pension roll of the company that last employed him.

HOLMES.—Hamill Holmes, for many years a well known contractor at State College, died Wednesday morning of last week, as the result of angina pectoris. Two weeks ago he had several teeth extracted which resulted in a nervous shock from which he was unable to recover.

He was a son of James H. and Emily McKibben Holmes and was born at State College on Sept. 5th, 1870, hence was 61 years and one month old. He married Miss Alta Kennedy who survives with two sons, Harris and Frank Holmes, both of State College. He also leaves the following brothers and sisters: Dr. R. E. Holmes, of Harrisburg; Mrs. Albert Deal, I. C. Hon. J. Laird, James H. and Miss Mabel Holmes of State College, and Mrs. J. B. Martin, of Nittany.

Rev. Jones and Rev. Martin officiated at the funeral held Friday afternoon. Burial was made in the Pine Hill cemetery.

PRESSLER.—Edward Pressler, a native of lower Penns Valley, was found dead on Sunday morning a week ago at Wheeling, W. Va., according to advices received by relatives about Millheim. The cause of death is not given but is thought to have been heart failure.

Mr. Pressler had been in Millheim a week previous to his death, at which time he had been a guest of O. B. Shawver. He formerly resided at Williamsport, but of late was a resident of Orlando, Florida.

He is survived by a daughter, now a resident of Washington, D. C., and these brothers and sisters: C. W. Pressler, of Millheim; John W., and Mrs. O. J. Auman, of Haines township; Harvey, of Illinois, and William, of California. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Pressler and was born in Penn township about 67 years ago.

Moshannon Bank Closes. The Moshannon National Bank at Phillipsburg, closed its doors the middle of last week, due to the continuous withdrawals by depositors. The bank's condition was first class, but the local loans, although good, could not be liquidated fast enough to meet the demands of depositors. The bank lists its total assets and liabilities at \$2,021,608.24. The bank was capitalized at \$150,000 and showed total deposits of \$1,418,461.60, including \$453,074.0 on demand and \$965,387.70 time deposits. Capital, surplus and undivided profits totalled \$320,644.82, as found in the last report. The bank also carried \$155,000 in U. S. government securities

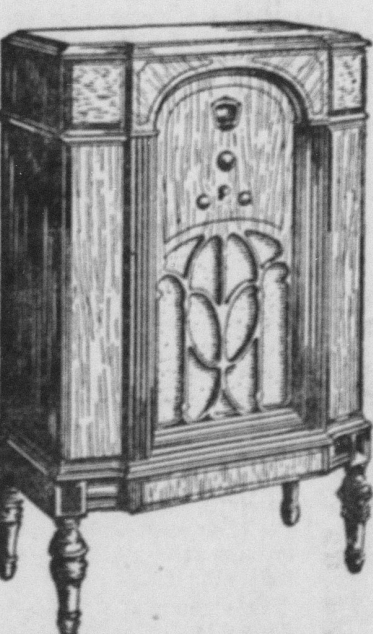

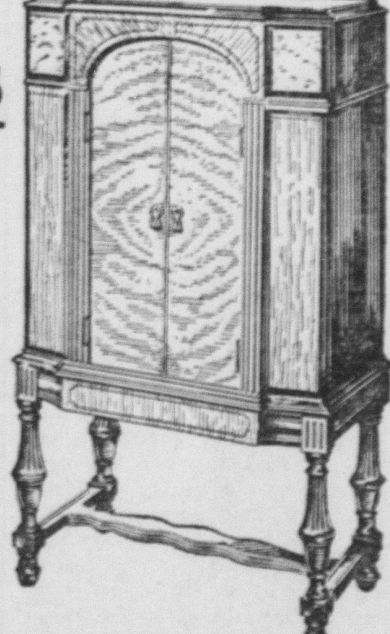

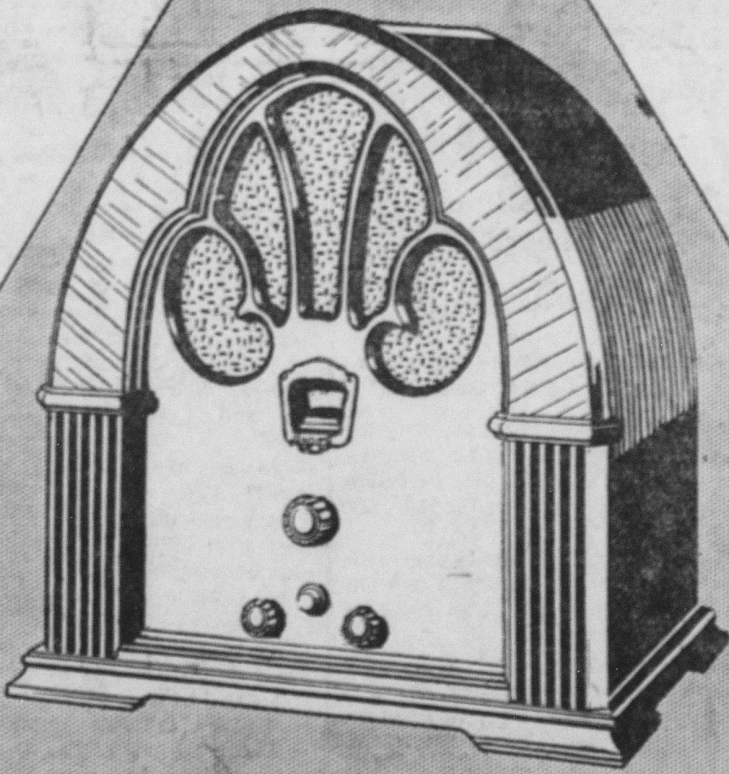
