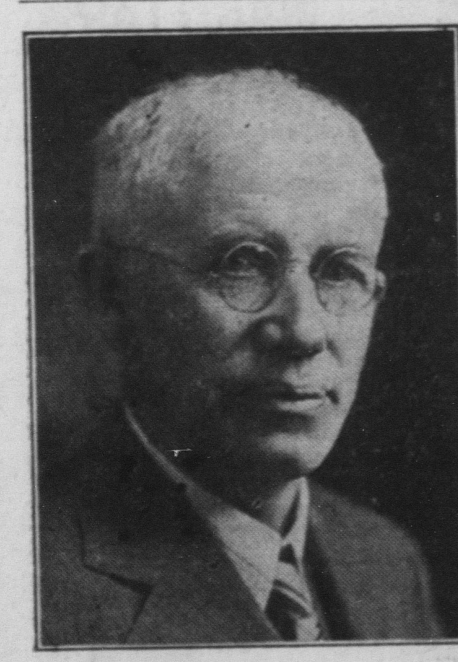
D. A. McDOWELL
