LESHER ELECTED JUDGE IN UNION-SNYDER DISTRICT

Johnson Carried Only Two Precincts in Judicial District—Held in Ball for December Court.

In the greatest political turnover in the half-century of the Union-Snyder judicial district, each normally five to one Republican, Curtis C. Lesher, Democrat, of Lewisburg, was elected President Judge by a district plurality of 3778 over Miller A. Johnson, Republican nominee, also of Lewisburg, and son of Federal Judge Albert W. Johnson.

Lesher carried all of the 22 precincts of Union county and 21 of the 23 of Snyder county. Johnson and Coryell each carried one district in Snyder.

Complete returns in Union county give Lesher 4441; Johnson, 2393; Coryell, 225. In Snyder county: Lesher, 2642; Johnson, 1933; Coryell, 1216. Totals for the district, Lesher, 8104; Johnson, 4326; Coryell, 1441.

Lesher was unopposed in the Democratic primary. Johnson won the Republican nomination in September by a plurality of 569 over Harry Coryell, of Sellersburg. Coryell thereupon opened his campaign as a sticker candidate and succeeded in having the October grand jury investigate alleged fraud in excessive expenditure of money in Snyder county in Johnson's behalf.

Following the grand jury's sensational report, Johnson was arraigned before Justice of the Peace, C. Arthur Miller of Penn township, and held in ball for trial at the December court, Snyder county, for questionable procedures in his primary campaign.

UTTLEY, DEMOCRAT, WINS MIFFLIN JUDGESHIP

W. W. Uttley, Democrat, long a practicing attorney in Lewistown, was elected judge of Mifflin county, over Judge Paul S. Lehman by a majority of 490 votes. Judge Lehman was appointed Judge by Governor Pinchot when Mifflin county was made a separate judicial district. The appointment, it is said, came about through the friendship of Mrs. Pinchot and Mrs. Lehman.

Other officers in Mifflin county elected are C. F. Henry, treasurer, commissioner; commissioners, C. G. Kauffman, H. H. Laub, Jr., Republicans, of Lewistown, and G. W. Carson, Democrat, of Belleville. Howard O. Lantz was unopposed for district attorney; George H. Rickard, Republican, prothonotary; W. B. Rodgers, Republican, register and recorder; Sylvester Becker, Grace Arnold Shields and J. H. French, directors of poor. The total vote cast in the county was 10,698.

DEATHS.

Decker, of near Centre Hall, passed out of this life Monday night. The body was brought to the Decker home on Tuesday from where funeral services will be held this (Thursday) afternoon at 2:00 o'clock, Rev. Harold A. Pruyn, pastor of the deceased, in charge of the services, with interment at Spruce-town, Mrs. Decker having long been an active member in the Spruce-town Methodist church.

The deceased was Miss Elizabeth Shirk prior to her marriage, a daughter of Joseph and Agnes (Shires) Shirk, and was aged 62 years. She is survived by her husband, previously named, and one son, Clarence, at home; also, by two sisters, namely, Mrs. Tamer Kern, Spring Mills, and Mrs. Benjamin Gentzel.

WEIBLY.—Mrs. Sarah Ann Weibly, of Lemont, died at her home Saturday noon after an illness of five and one-half years.

She was born four miles east of Milton, on March 12, 1849, the daughter of Magdalene and Joshua Cole, making her age 82 years, 7 months and 25 days.

Besides attending school at Follmer's Church, she attended Bucknell University. On July 2, 1874, she was married to John A. Weibly who, up until the time of his retirement in 1916, had been an employe of the Pennsylvania Railroad since 1875. They moved to Centre county May 1, 1886, where they have since resided.

She was a member of the Lutheran church and Rebekah Lodge. In addition to her husband, Mrs. Weibly is survived by a brother, Wm. P. Cole; a daughter, Mrs. John R. Schreck, and two granddaughters, Madeline and Lois Schreck, all of Lemont.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, from the Lutheran church at Boalsburg, with the Rev. Wagner, pastor of the church, officiating.

HARTER.—Anna Mary Harter died at the home of her daughter, Anna Mary, wife of Walter Rote, in State College, on Saturday morning, from gall stones. The deceased was the widow of Ephraim Harter, who died in the fall of 1921, and for many years the couple lived at Stone Mill. She was the eldest daughter of Wm. W. and Sarah Rankin Royer, and was born in Potter township. She was aged 68 years, 10 months and 22 days.

The deceased leaves to mourn her loss, two children—George W. Harter, Potter township, and Mrs. Holt, State College, where the death occurred. There also survive her a brother and two sisters—Wm. Royer, Juniata; Mrs. W. W. Bible and Mrs. Carrie Saunders, Altoona, and Mrs. Christie Smith, Bellefonte.

Interment was made Tuesday forenoon at Tusseyville, Rev. John Harkins, of State College Lutheran church, and Rev. S. F. Greenhoe, of Centre Hall, officiating.

WELLS.—Martha Rote Wells, wife of Thomas Wells, died at the Cresson hospital from pulmonary tuberculosis on Thursday of last week. The body was brought to the home of Mrs. Wells' parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Kern, east of Coburn, by funeral director F. V. Goodhart, whence the funeral was held Monday afternoon, with interment at Aaronsburg, Rev. S. F. Greenhoe was the minister in charge. Deceased was aged 23 years, 1 month and 27 days, and had been married less than a year. Mrs. Wells for some time lived in a cabin on top of Nittany Mountain, but her condition became so serious that she was removed to the Cresson hospital.

Surviving her are, her husband, her parents, and several brothers and sisters.

STOVER.—Jonas Stover, aged 55 years, of Hubersburg, was taken suddenly ill Friday afternoon and died in the Centre County hospital that night. He was well known in the section, where he had operated a threshing outfit.

His wife whose maiden name was Miss Elizabeth Scholl, died a number of years ago. There survive four daughters, namely, Minnie and Belle, at home; Sallie, at Laurelton, and Goldie, who since her babyhood has lived with her uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Slatterbeck, at Tusseyville.

HARRIS.—George Harris, a native of Bellefonte, passed away at the Presbyterian hospital in Philadelphia, Friday evening as the result of complication of diseases. He was born and reared in Bellefonte and left there about 25 years ago. He was aged 44 years.

The deceased was a son of John and Mary (Eckenroth) Rimmey, both deceased, and had long been a resident of the vicinity of Pleasant Gap. He engaged in farming and later followed the carpenter trade. He is survived by a wife, whose maiden name was Miss Caroline Frazer, and three children—Earl, Pleasant Gap; Anna, wife of Fred Roush, State College; Miss Bertha Rimmey, R. N., at home; also by two brothers and two sisters—Charles H. Rimmey, Pleasant Gap; William Rimmey, State College; Mrs. Clayton Gettig and Mrs. Martin Keller, Pleasant Gap.

Had he lived until January he would have attained his seventieth year.

KEELER, REPUBLICAN, CONTESTING BOOB'S ELECTION

Measures have been taken by Harry V. Keeler, defeated Republican candidate for Sheriff, to contest the election of John M. Boob, Democrat, shown by official count as having a majority of two votes.

The ballot box of Millheim borough was impounded on Tuesday morning, having been taken to the Court House by Sheriff Dunlap. The petition sets forth that irregularities in voting were permitted by the election board, specifying particularly that votes were cast by parties not having paid tax within the specified time of two years.

The ballots will be recounted and examined Friday morning, Messrs. Charles F. Cooke and Hunter Knisely, Republicans, Bellefonte, and Charles B. Freeman, Democrat, Philipsburg, were named by President Judge M. Ward Fleming to perform that service.

Although but one ballot box is impounded at this time, application may be made to open ballot boxes of other districts by representatives of either the Republican or Democratic candidate.

Centre county's interests ought to be well taken care of at the special session of the State Legislature, since Representative John L. Holmes has apparently given A. L. Shaffer, Mifflin county's representative, a look in on affairs on the south side of Centre county. Representative Shaffer is credited with having put on the Pinchot road program the most unimportant road in Potter and Gregg townships—the Sinking Creek road, leading from Centre Hill to Spring Mills, in preference to a much used road thru Georges Valley. Representative Shaffer, by the way, owns a farm along the Sinking Creek road.
