BOOKS, OLD AND NEW,

BY S. S. SHALLCROSS

His experiences as a book collector were related by Samuel S. Shallcross in an interesting way to the members of the Bellefonte Kiwanis Club at the meeting Tuesday noon in the Penn Belle hotel. Mrs. Shallcross began his hobby of collecting books some years ago, when he purchased the library of an aged physician, consisting of about 8,000 volumes. In this collection were included a number of first editions, and books printed as early as in the sixteenth century, as well as those of the seventeenth century, the eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries. One of the most interesting of these was the medical log book of the U. S. frigate, Constitution. This book Mr. Shallcross resold for \$925. Mr. Shallcross had with him a number of volumes to illustrate his address and, through them, explained why there are such variations in the value of books.

In cooperation with the Philipsburg and Tyrone clubs the local club is planning a home talent show which will be produced in each of the three communities. The tentative date set is April 4, 5 and 6. FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Give Chicks Room—

It is a safe rule to allow one square foot of floor space for every three chicks. For best results not more than 350 chicks should be brooded together in one pen or brooder house.

Order Forest Trees—

Forest tree seedling orders should be filed with the Pennsylvania Department of Forests and Waters by this time. The supply of the most desirable planting stock is low. To be certain of getting what you want, place your order immediately.

Plant Farm Garden—

A good farm garden will produce a sufficient quantity of various kinds of vegetables for a 12-month supply. Such a garden will be profitable, supply an abundance of tasty, healthful food, and its management will prove to be a pleasure rather than a drudgery.

Need Careful Planting—

Four important points must be observed in planting trees and shrubs. Have the location properly prepared with good soil. Do not plant too deeply. Pack the earth carefully around the roots. Water well in order to fill the soil cavities.

Control Fruit Pests—

If San Jose scale is serious, applying the dormant spray of lime-sulphur is a timely practice. Give the trees a thorough drenching, say State College entomologists.

Sweeten Sour Soils—

Alfalfa requires a sweet soil. Some soils are suitable for this legume and others can be put in the proper condition. Your county agent will test soil samples and inform you of the amount of lime needed.

Feed for Fast Gains—

Early farrowed pigs of good breeding, if given full feeding and kept in a sanitary environment, can be fattened for the early fall market when prices invariably are higher than later.

ARE "PACIFIST" PREACHERS LEADING YOUTH TO COMMUNISM?

Dr. Leinbach, Editor of the Reformed Church Messenger, Says No.—Defends Church's Peace Program.

Charges that the "pacifist preachers" of the Protestant churches are "the greatest problems in America and are leading the young to Communism" were emphatically denied a few days ago by the Rev. Dr. Paul S. Leinbach.

Dr. Leinbach, who is editor of the Reformed Church Messenger, with headquarters in Philadelphia, issued his defense of the Church's peace program in answer to a statement by Colonel Orvel Johnson, executive secretary of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps Association.

"The greatest menace to the R. O. T. C. is the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America," said the statement made by Colonel Johnson. "The good Church people do not realize to what extent they have been misled and misrepresented by the few who have succeeded in controlling the small gatherings called Church Study Conferences at which political subjects are acted upon. To just the extent that the Federal Council of the Churches succeeds in inducing our young men to refuse to prepare properly for and to perform the full obligation of citizenship, they have helped them on the road to Communism, the first step of which is atheism. How to protect the Protestant churches from the pacifist preachers is one of the greatest problems in America at this time."

Dr. Leinbach in his defense of the peace program of the Church, said: "It may be doubted, of course, whether the Colonel is as much interested in protecting the Protestant churches as he is in protecting his own job. Sorry as we may be to incur his ill-will because we cannot agree with his views, it may be permitted us at least to express our appreciation for his unintended eulogy on the power and influence of the Churches and of the Council. Certainly in this matter the Federal Council is quite fully expressing the views of its constituent bodies, for the most drastic action against the compulsory R. O. T. C. has been taken by such high judiciaries as the General Conference of the M. E. Church; the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A.; the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church; the National Council of Congregational Churches; the International Convention of the Disciples of Christ; the Northern Baptist Convention; the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America; the various District Synods of our own Reformed Church in the U. S., and many other religious bodies. But any agencies which oppose compulsory military training as contrary both to the spirit of our religion and of a truly democratic nation are bound to be regarded by militarists as a 'menace'."

"Blessed are the peace-makers," said Jesus. And His loyal followers may well regard as a 'menace' those who, instead of praying for and co-operating with the peace-makers, are scoffing at them and opposing all their efforts to disarm the nationalistic military camps which are a constant and increasing incitement to war and bloodshed."
