Mrs. Mary McCool, Mrs. Dora Bartley and Mrs. Katherine Wagner, who were on the sick list, have recovered.

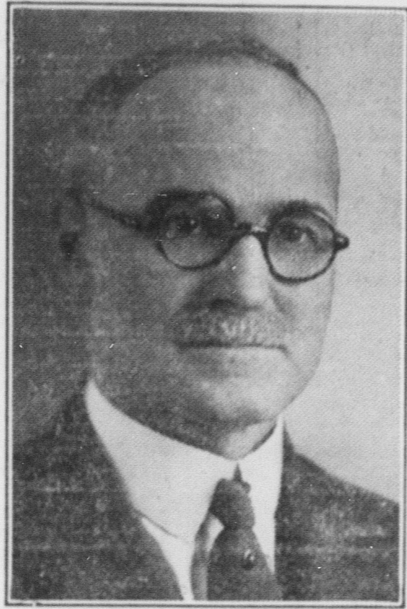
The K. G. E. and L. G. E. banquet was a success.

THREE ROAD PROJECTS FOR CENTRE COUNTY

According to announcement made by the Highway Commissioner on Tuesday the State will build 13.46 miles of new road in Centre county during the coming summer.

The link between the present terminus of the new concrete highway from State College to the Buffalo Run road at Matternville and the Bald Eagle highway near Martha Furnace will be completed. It will be 3.39 miles and is very heavy construction because it crosses the Bald Eagle mountain. This section like the one following is on State Highway Route No. 250.

8.57 miles further construction on Route 250, the road from Potters Mills to State College, will be built.

1.87 miles from Pine Grove Mills south on Route 45 to the Huntingdon county line.

FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Improve Garden Soils—

Manure, or other forms of organic matter, will greatly improve garden soils. Apply early enough for straw material to decay. Plow or spade deeply and thoroughly. Then apply fertilizer broadcast and work into the soil.

Force Chickens to Roost—

Providing low forcing roosts for chicks as early as 3 to 4 weeks of age will help to prevent coccidiosis, say State College poultry specialists.

Start Strawberries Early—

Runners taking root in June or early July are several times more productive than the later ones which set in late August and thereafter. An early start is important. Prepare the soil early and set the plants in April.

Detect Poor Cows—

Record keeping of milk production of dairy cows becomes of greater importance as milk prices decline. Detect work should be started at once and continued until all profit losers are definitely spotted.

Remove Mulch Soon—

Be sure to take off the mulch on shrubbery borders and flower beds before active growth starts. If this is left on too long it softens the plants. Do not remove the mulch on a bright sunny day.

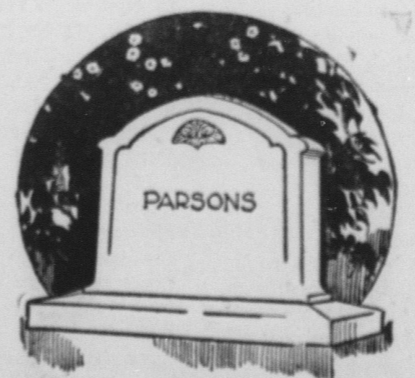
