

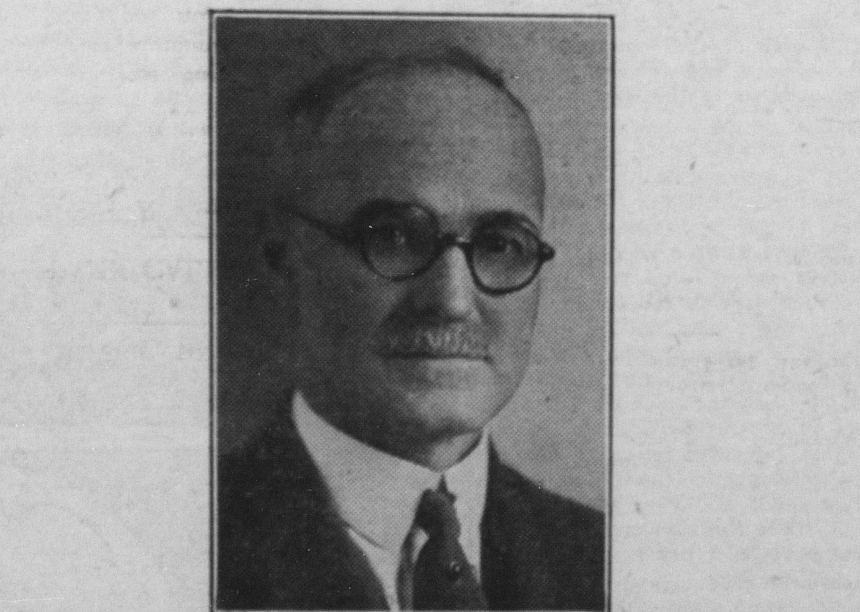
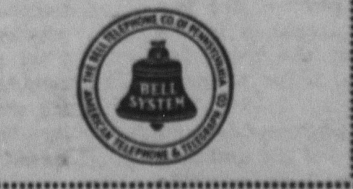
The Charred Match
