DEATHS.
NEESE.—Mrs. Ellen Blanche Neese, wife of William Neese, passed out of this life on Thursday evening after an illness from complications, at Spring Mills. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon from the home, and after interment in the Heckman cemetery services were continued in the Reformed church, of which denomination the deceased was long a member. Rev. D. R. Keener in charge.
The deceased was a daughter of John F. and Fietta Fisher Weaver, and was born in Gregg township. She was aged 57 years, 11 months and 20 days. Beside the husband there survive six daughters, namely: Mrs. Charles Zettie, Georges Valley; Mrs. Raymond Boob, Spring Mills; Mrs. Edward Smeltzer, Bellefonte; Mrs. William Fliegel, Maywood, N. J.; Miss Naomi, Tionesta; Miss Mary, in training in the school for nurses in University Hospital, Philadelphia. Two sons died with flu during the war, one was in training in a military camp at the time, and the other at home.
Two sisters and a brother also survive: Mrs. Samuel Kennison, Denver, Colorado; Mrs. Mary Miller, Battle Creek, Mich., and Oscar Heckman, of Cameron, Missouri.

HECKMAN.—A telegram received on Saturday by John A. Heckman contained the brief statement that his brother, Frank N. Heckman, had died suddenly, at Polson, Montana.
The deceased was the youngest son of William and Nancy Rupp Heckman, and was aged 53 years. He was born at Farmers Mills. When but a small boy, in 1888, he went to live with his sister, Mr. (Dr.) Domer Smith, at Freeburg, and later accompanied them to Illinois. Later he went to the north-west and finally located in the Montana town named where he conducted a laundry. In 1911 he married Miss Bertha Sawyer, who survives him; there were no children.
The brothers and sisters surviving are: John A. and George Heckman, Mrs. D. K. Keller, Centre Hall; Mrs. John Lucas, Lewistown, and Mrs. Zora Eckels, Freeport, Ill.

STOVER.—Adam Q. Stover died at his home in Clifford, Michigan, on Saturday, from complications, aged 84 years. He was a son of Martin and Julia (Stover) Stover and was born in Haines township, near Woodward. On attaining his majority he went to Michigan, and a few years later located near North Branch, about sixty miles north of Detroit, and took up farming. He purchased an unimproved section of land, and later erected substantial buildings on it. Two brothers—Emanuel and Nathan—purchased adjoining sections. Early in the seventies he married Miss Sue Amanda Smith, daughter of Dr. Peter Smith, and sister of the writer. Her death occurred the latter part of the nineties.
On retiring from farming operations some years ago, the deceased lived with his daughters in Detroit, Mich., until recent years when he and two of his daughters, Mrs. Ella McVico and Mrs. Edith Tibbits, returned to the family home in Clifford, a town which sprung up near the Stover farm.
There survive the deceased the two daughters named, and Mrs. Mabel McKenzie, of Portland, Oregon. Also, one sister, Mrs. Phoebe Emerick, in Centre Hall, who is the only survivor of the Martin Stover children.

HARTER.—Mrs. Anna (Dorman) Harter died at the family home in Nittany Valley after but two days' illness of paralysis, aged about fifty years. While she was seated in a chair shortly after arising for the day she collapsed. Her son, Clair Dorman, picked her up and placed her on a bed, but she expired two and a half days later without having regained consciousness.
Surviving her are her husband, her father and a stepson. Funeral services were held from the home, after which interment was made at Aaronsburg.

CAMP.—After an illness extending over a considerable period of time, William R. Camp passed away at his home in Tyrone, to which place he removed from Centre Hall during the nineties. While in Tyrone he engaged in the furniture business. He is survived by a wife, his eldest son, Harry, and daughter, Miss Lou, of Tyrone. Burial was made at Tyrone.
The deceased came to Centre Hall in 1883 from Milroy. Wife a resident here he engaged as a cabinet maker and undertaker, and later carried factory-made furniture. He was a member of Old Fort Masonic Lodge in Centre Hall. He was aged 83 years.

WHIPPO.—Newton Whippo, aged 87 years died on Saturday at the Spring township poor home, from cerebral hemorrhages. Interment was made Monday at Pleasant Gap. He was a Civil War veteran and enterprisingly rehearsed many incidents in which he was the principal or an eye witness. Unfortunately he left the U. S. service without first having obtained the proper credentials and consequently was unable to secure a pension.

TRESSLER.—Mrs. Alice Tressler, wife of Henry Tressler, died at her home at Houserville, following a brief illness with the flu and complications. She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Miller and would have been 57 years old in June. She had been a member of the United Brethren church, at Houserville, for many years. She is survived by her husband and five children: Chester Tressler, of Oak Hall; Mrs. Russell Stover, Mrs. Nevin Corman and Linn Tressler, all of Houserville, and Jack, at home. She also leaves one brother and two sisters: Charles Miller and Mrs. Frank Ray, of Bellefonte, and Mrs. Garrity, of Valley View.
The funeral services were held in the United Brethren church at Houserville, with burial in the Pine Hall cemetery.

BARTZ.—Ruth L. Bartz, wife of Paul Bartz, died at her home in Youngstown, Ohio, following an illness of five days' duration of pneumonia.
Mrs. Bartz was a daughter of Clarence E. and Hannah (Hackenberg) Musser and was born in Aaronsburg; she was aged 32 years.
Surviving her are four children: Marion, Charles, Norma Jean and Ida Mae, all at home with the sorrowing husband. Also surviving are the parents and these brothers and sisters: Mrs. John Tressler, of Bellefonte; Sumner Musser, James Musser, Mrs. Elmer Long, all of Aaronsburg, and Mrs. Raymond Wingard, of near Coburn.

The body was brought to Aaronsburg where interment was made, Rev. Louis V. Leshar officiating.

KORMAN.—Elizabeth May Korman, relict of the late Joseph Korman, was found in a dying condition in her home, in Rebersburg, by neighbors who noted a lack of activity about the Korman home. Mrs. Korman was found near her bed in a manner indicating that she was in the act of retiring for the night when stricken with an attack of apoplexy. Physician were called but to no avail, as she expired shortly after being found. It is stated that she probably lay stricken for about forty-eight hours before her plight was discovered.
Mrs. Korman, whose maiden name was Walker, was aged 57 years, 8 months and 26 days. Her husband died about four months ago.
She was a member of the Rebersburg Lutheran church and her pastor, Rev. E. N. Fry, had charge of the services. Interment was made in the Reformed Lutheran cemetery in Rebersburg.

LOHR.—Mrs. Sarah Anna Cramer Lohr died at the home of her son, George A. Lohr, west of Old Fort, on Tuesday of last week after an illness of over a year due to complications. Interment was made in the Pine Hall cemetery on Friday. She would have attained her 63rd year had she lived until the 27th of this month.
The deceased was the widow of Frank Lohr, who died exactly two years prior to the time of her burial. There survive her a daughter, Mrs. John Kelley, of Milesburg, and a son, George A., with whom she made her home at the time of her death. Also surviving are these sisters and brothers: Mrs. Elsie Corl, Mrs. Mary Hoy and Jacob Cramer, State College; Frank Cramer, Tusseyville; William Cramer, Lemont, and Adam Cramer, Williamsport.

GUISER.—Andrew Guiser died at his home in Madisonburg, due to ailments incident to his advanced age of 85 years and 2 months.
Mr. Guiser was born in Wurtemberg, Germany, February 2, 1847, and when but a small boy he, with his parents, John and Anna Maria Armbruster Guiser, crossed the Atlantic in a sailing vessel.
Mr. Guiser was twice married—first to Mary Smeltzer and later to Julia Dorman. The latter survives to mourn the loss of a devoted husband.

DEATH OF CHILD.—Donald, 22 months old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm Musser, died in Bellefonte, Saturday night from convulsions. The child is a grandson of Mrs. Mollie Ishler, of State College.

HARRIS.—John Babbs Harris, aged 77 years, died on Friday at his home in Lamar. He is survived by a wife, seven sons and three daughters; also, a sister, Mrs. Sadie Beck, of Nittany.

THREE-DAY SESSION OF SPECIAL COURT

At the three-day term of special court called on Monday of last week, a number of cases held over from previous sessions were heard.
Fred Loveland appeared before court and plead guilty to having embezzled \$560.70 from the funds of the Greyhound bus company. He was ordered to make restitution for the money taken, pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of \$1 and undergo probation for a period of three years.
Raymond Harpster, of State College, charged with driving a car while intoxicated, was found not guilty.
Murray W. Ziegler, former State Policeman, charged with aggravated assault and battery on the person of W. A. White of Centre Hall several months ago, was found not guilty but was ordered to pay half the costs and Mr. White was instructed to pay the other half. This case grew out of an altercation which ensued between the defendant, who was then a member of the State Police force at Rockview and Mr. White, whose premises the officer was searching.
Leroy Bechtel, 23, of near Woodward, who was caught in the act of robbing the general store of V. B. Everett at Madisonburg on the night of March 17, appeared in court with a plea of guilty and was ordered to pay a fine of \$1, costs of prosecution and undergo probation for three years.
Robert William Rudy of Lytle's Addition, State College, charged with the larceny of a Chevrolet coupe belonging to Frank McClellan on December 24, 1931, was discharged when the jury complied with the motion of the attorney that they bring in a verdict of not guilty.

H. B. Walker, of Spring Mills, charged with the violation of the motor code, was found not guilty and the costs placed on the county.
Herbert Hollibaugh of Spring township, charged with failure to provide bond for \$500 for the support of his wife as previously ordered by the court was given from three to six months in the Allegheny county workhouse.

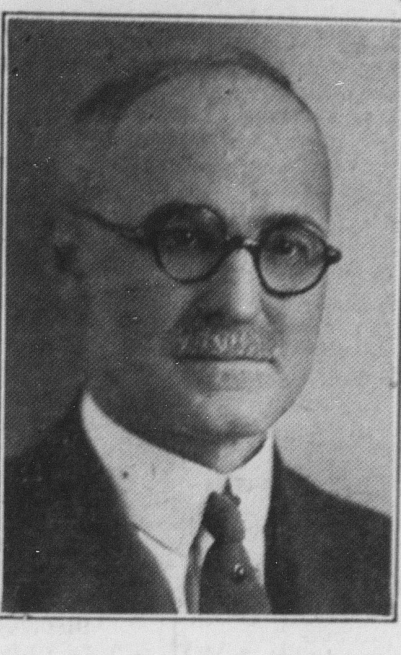
