HIGH SCHOOL PRESS GROUPS TO MEET AT STATE COLLEGE

Three to four hundred high school students and teachers connected with school publications are expected to attend the annual conference of the Pennsylvania School Press Association which will be held at the Pennsylvania State College on Saturday. The conference is being sponsored by the college department of journalism which has been instrumental in obtaining the principal speakers. Among them will be Fred Fuller Shedd, editor-in-chief of the Philadelphia Bulletin and president of the American Society of Newspaper Editors; Franklin M. Heck, editor of the American Boy; Gus M. Steoimeta, editor of the Harrisburg Telegraph; Walter W. Krebs, publisher of the Johnstown Tribune and vice president of the Pennsylvania Newspaper Publishers' Association; William J. Mapel, head of the School of Journalism at Washington and Lee University; Dean C. W. Stoddard, School of Liberal Arts at Penn State, and Dean Wilj Grant Chambers, School of Education at the college.
