

County Champions of 1931, Open Season With 4-2 Defeat



REBERSBURG TAKES OPENER IN TEN INNINGS, 4-2

Championship baseball teams, this year, are having a hard time to round into form, as witness the World's champions in the National league, the A's in the American league, and also our Centre Hall "champs" in the Centre County league. The locals opened the league season here, on Saturday, by meeting a re-conditioned Rebersburg team—a team which promises to give other clubs in the league plenty to think about. Saturday's game went ten innings, Rebersburg very luckily scoring a brace of runs in their half of the 10th on a bit of poor defense work at the local's 3rd base corner. First up in the tenth for the enemy was "Dutch" Blerly, who was a two-guon man in the afternoon's fray. He smote a double to left field; Tyson was hit by a pitched ball; P. Blerly then socked one to short; Martz fielded cleanly and tossed to Harry Gross at third, for a force out, but the said Harry was not there. The ball sped out of the playing field, two runs scored, and the game was virtually over, for Centre Hall, while staging a belated rally after two were down in the 10th, failed to come across. P. Martz and Fetteroff struck out, but the fans were given a chance to shout when Stover and Bruce Knarr followed with singles. With Emery at the plate, hopes ran high, but his foul fly was taken by Brumgard after a hard run, and all hands went home.

Both sides played scoreless ball for the first five innings. Then, in the 6th, Rebersburg drew first blood on two hits and a base on balls. The locals came back and tied it up in their half on Stover's and Knarr's singles. In the seventh Centre Hall went into the lead. Frank opened with a hit, stole second and scored on Gross' 2-bagger. In the 8th Rebersburg tied it up again when "Dutch" Blerly hit through short to score Brumgard, who was on first by virtue of a base on balls.

Martz's pitching for the locals was slightly below par, while Heckel's working of the corners proved an enigma to the home batters.

Frank, for the locals, was the outstanding star. His fielding was uncanny, while his hitting land base-running smacked of mid-season form. His catch off Tyson's bat in the fourth prevented a home run. Ralph Martz at short made a lol-a-palooza of a catch when he took a "Texas leaguer" over his shoulder on P. Blerly in the 6th inning, and doubled another Blerly at second. There are four Blerlys on the Rebersburg team—but the greatest of these on Saturday was the bespectacled "Dutch." How that boy hits! Four hits—two 2-baggers and two singles—out of five times at bat, as a good afternoon's work in anybody's ball yard.
