PENN STATE TO ADMIT NEW APPLICANTS JULY 1

Admissions to the freshman class at the Penna. State College will be opened July 1. Admission will be offered to qualified applicants in the order in which the applications are received.

As in the past few years, the 1932 freshman class will be limited to approximately 1250 students, the registrar said, lack of facilities prohibiting the admission of a larger class. Admissions will be made both by certification and by the standing attained in a college aptitude test.

High school graduates who may be admitted on certificates may take the college aptitude test which will be given during the summer in centrally located points throughout Pennsylvania.

Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Yield Good Honey—

The farmer who plants locust seedlings for fence posts can get a yield of high-grade honey from the blossoms 3 or 4 years after the trees are planted. These trees grow rapidly and flower profusely almost every year. Some growers are now making this double use of their grove.

This Fruit Is Needed—

Careful observation will determine whether fruit thinning is needed or not. If the fruit set on the bearing branches or spurs averages closer than six inches on the limb, thinning of apples is considered unnecessary. For peaches, 4 to 6 inches is considered adequate to mature fruit of good size and quality.

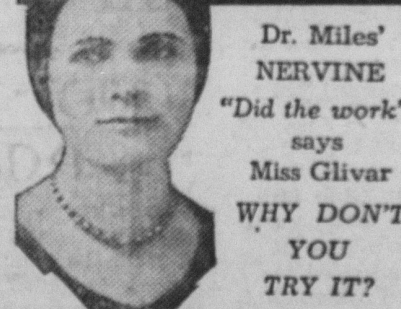

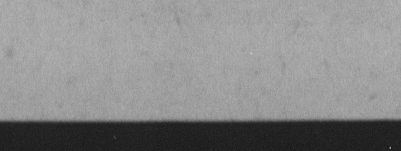
