NEW TEACHING STANDARDS

EFFECTIVE SEPT. 1ST

The State Council of Education on Friday ruled that after Sept. 1st, 1932, elementary school teachers in Pennsylvania must have had four years of academic and professional work of college grade. Teachers now holding elementary certificates will not be affected.

Dr. James N. Rule, council chairman, who announced the ruling, said there were two reasons behind the council's action.

The council, he said, wishes to bring a better balance between the number of teachers who need to be trained each year and the number of positions that actually are available. It also wishes to equalize elementary teaching abilities with that of high schools. The new standards, Rule explained,
