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PUSHING ROAD CONSTRUCTION ON NEW CONCRETE ROAD

A considerable amount of road construction work has already been done on the Tusseyville-Boalsburg road project by Shoemaker Brothers, subcontractors under R. G. Lassiter & Co., of Raleigh, N. C. From Tusseyville to Tusseyville workmen are busy at a number of points.

At the Centre Hall Station the Rosser Company is preparing to handle the vast amount of material used in the concrete construction—ballast, sand and cement. Stone for the contract will be furnished by the White Rock Quarries. The plant near the station, under lease by them, will be put into operation if needed to keep the supply of stone. "Batches" (stone sand) into operation if needed to keep up to the railroad station where J. W. Fuller is in charge of men making preparation for that work.
