Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Give Cows Comfort—

A good fly spray and darkened stables will do much to protect cows from annoyance and torture by flies. Cow comfort cheapens costs of milk production.

Paint Window Boxes—

The outside of window boxes should be finished and varnished in the natural color of the wood or painted a stone gray or dull brown color. Whitewashing the interior of the box will prevent the wood from decaying and will assist in keeping the soil sweet.

Plant Locust Trees—

Black locusts have good features as an idle land crop. They make an excellent fence post timber in 15 to 20 years, prevent erosion, improve the nitrogen content of the soil, and bear blossoms from which bees can gather nectar for good quality honey.

Treat Grubby Lawns—

If lawns have not been treated with led arsenate, this should be done before
