Bellefonte continued to bid for first-place position in the second half of the C. C. B. league race by defeating Centre Hall here, Saturday afternoon in a slugfest of balls and bats. After pounding two pitchers, Thomas and Brown, for eleven hits, Bellefonte's ace, Montgomery, was called to stem the

tide in the 7th inning, and retired Centre Hall in 1-2-3 order for the remaining 3 innings. Meanwhile, Bellefonte was taking its turn on the other end of the see-saw and finished in the up position when the game terminated.

The locals scored 4 runs in the first inning on four hits—a 3-bagger by Goodhart, a double by Emery and singles by Crawford and Reiber. Bellefonte put 3 over in the initial inning and forged ahead in the 3rd—5 to 4—only to have Centre Hall tie the score in the 4th. Durst was relieved by Jamison in the 3rd, but Bellefonte had no trouble to hit his offerings, going ahead in the 4th inning. The locals again went into the lead in the 6th, when they scored 4 runs, and putting Brown to rout. Montgomery was called to the rescue, and well did he rescue. Bellefonte kept up hitting Jamison and put over 2 runs in the 7th and another in the 8th, making the final score 11 to 9.

The game came to an abrupt stop in the 6th when Bellefonte's umpire ruled Anderson's hit to left field a fair ball. Arguments waxed strong and the field swarmed with spectators eager to get a square deal or fight. However, the ump's ruling held, and play was continued. The box score:
