RANKIN WEAVER IS ADJUDGED INSANE

Adjudged mentally unsound in the findings of a lunacy commission, David Rankin Weaver, held in the Millis county jail for the murder of his wife, will be placed in a State institution for criminally insane, following order by Judge W. H. Utley.

Weaver shot and killed his wife as she returned from church last January. In the decision, Judge Utley directed that the evidence in the case should be impounded by the district attorney in the event Weaver is released from the institution.
