From the band stand on Grange Park, on Thursday forenoon, Col. Frederick B. Kerr, Democratic nominee for Congress in the twenty-third district, was introduced by County Treasurer R. F. Hunter, who made a short and snappy address, a brief outline of which appears below.

In his introduction, Mr. Hunter devoted his talk to affairs nearest the heart of the average voter—local government and taxes. The Reporter's special correspondent has prepared a report on the address which will appear in a later issue of this paper.

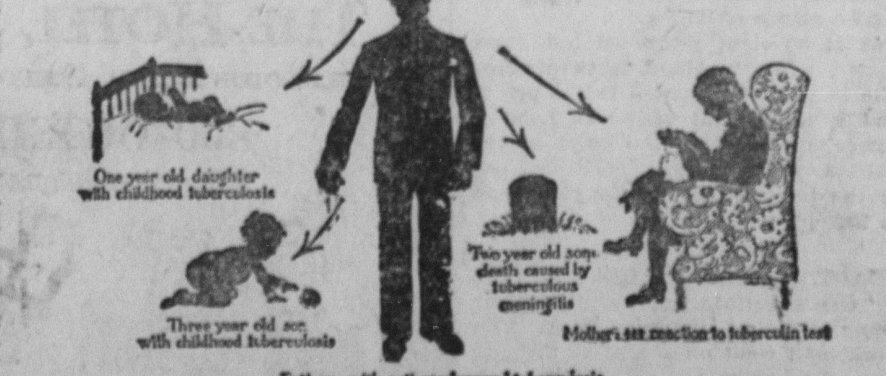
Robert J. Miller, Democratic nominee for General Assembly a resident of State College, made a few remarks which were well received by the audience. Mr. Miller is well informed on political matters in the county, State and Nation, and will enter upon an aggressive campaign to win a seat in the lower house of representatives.

Col. Kerr in his address referred to the excessive high cost of government—Federal, State and local. It was using up so much of the National income that private business, including the farmers, can hardly exist, and recommended a tax consciousness on the part of every taxpayer and tax paying organization so that the impossible situation can be corrected.

Previous to these remarks Col. Kerr read the opening paragraphs of the Democratic Platform, setting forth the responsibility for the present state of affairs and called attention that they evidently consider this high cost of government the most important issue of this campaign, because they have placed it in number one position and in which they pledged themselves to

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"CONFESSION" COURT HELD BY JUDGE FLEMING

Large Number of Cases Not Needing To Be Heard Before a Jury Are Disposed Of.

Judge M. Ward Fleming disposed of a large number of criminal cases on Thursday and Friday. These were cases not needing trial by jury, and, of course, in each instance the defendant pleaded guilty. The defendant and manner of disposition of each case is noted below:

John Corral—pay costs, \$1.00 fine, and 60 days in Allegheny Work House. Merrill Anderson—sentence suspended upon payment of costs. Woodrow Meyers—probation for three years. Clayton Wolfe—not. pros. upon payment of costs.

Carroll Korman—pay costs and keep peace for 2 years. Leon Packer, et al.—costs, pay for corn, probation for two years. Ambrose Smead—costs, fine of \$50, probation for three years.
