FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Save Berry Plants—

Plantings of black raspberries should be at least 200 feet apart. In mixed plantings of these two berries plant pathology extension specialists of the Pennsylvania State College have found 55 per cent infection of streak on black raspberries while rows some distance away had a very small percentage of the disease.

Blanch Celery Plants—

Celery is blanched by excluding sunlight from the plant while it is growing. Home gardeners often place boards firmly along each side of the row. Heavy paper collars or drain tile placed around the individual plants also are effective.

Control Chicken Mites

Mites which live in crevices around the nests and roosts of the laying house sap the vitality of chickens, especially during the summer months. They can be controlled by painting or spraying the roosts, nests, and dropping boards with a red mite bait.

Grow Fine Flowers—

Dahlias are the show flowers. Water the plants freely and fertilize well to produce strong roots and perfect flowers.

Buy Purebred Ram—

The wise shepherd is taking advantage of the present price of a good purebred ram so that he can receive the margin paid on high quality market lambs next year.

Produce Clean Eggs—

To produce clean eggs provide one nest for every five birds, use shavings for nesting material, keep birds confined if possible, screen dropping boards with one and one-half inch mesh wire, and gather eggs frequently.
