Save Old Meadow-Where the new seeding does not have sufficient stand to furnish a good hay crop next year, it is advisable to leave the old madow for this purpose Wherever possible, it is good practice to top-dress this old meadow with high nitrogen fertilizer. Then the available manure can be applied to the

groud intended for corn. Keep Eggs Cool-Eggs should be held in a cool, wellventilated room free from odors. A cellar usually is the best place on the farm to hold eggs. A temperature of approximately 55 degrees is satisfactory. Eggs absorb odors very rapidly and, therefore, should not be kept near

anything that might taint their flavor. Trim Hedges Now-Hedges may be trimmed during the early part of September. Be sure to use sharp hedge shears for this purpose as the twigs are often bruised when

May Mulch Vegetables-Mulching with straw, lawn clpipings, or other refuse vegetable matter is often practiced during the summer and early fall on tomatoes and celery. This conserves moisture, eliminates cultivation and helps to control weeds.

Sow Lawn Mixture-For lawns in the open a good mixture, by weight, is 16 parts of Kentucky blue grass, 4 parts of red top, and 2 parts of white clover. For average conditions, the rate of seeding should be 2 or 3 pounds for a thousand square feet.


