TRESPASS SIGNS
Printed by "The Reporter"
Are Legal Signs.

Harrisburg, Pa., Aug. 25—The Pa. Department of Agriculture receives many inquiries from farmers on the proper wording of a valid trespass sign. A type of notice believed to be valid when prominently posted about the premises, one combining both the warning of the 1905 Trespass Act and the 1925 Stealing Act, is as follows:

NOTICE:

NO TRESPASSING OR STEALING ALLOWED.

All persons are hereby notified and warned neither to trespass on these premises under penalty of a fine not exceeding \$10.00 as provided by the Act of April 14, 1905, P. L. 169 and its amendments; nor to take, steal or carry away any property whatsoever under penalty of a fine not exceeding \$500 and imprisonment not exceeding three years, as provided by the Act of May, 1, 1925, P. L. 410.

Owner or Lessee

The signature should be in ink.

The above Trespass Sign, recommended by the Department of Agriculture, Harrisburg, can now be obtained at the office of The Reporter, Centre Hall, printed on a heavy cardboard in plain, bold type, at 5c each, 5 for 25c, 12 for 50c. SOCCER SCHEDULE DRAWN FOR CENTRE CO. HIGH SCHOOLS

Centre county High schools will again be formed into a league for playing soccer ball this fall. There will be two divisions—an eastern and a western—the eastern division having added Loganton High school, which is in Clinton county.

The schedule of games drawn up is as follows:

Eastern Division

Sept. 30—Rebersburg at Loganton; Hubbersburg at Millheim.

October 7—East Penna Valley at Rebersburg; Loganton at Hubbersburg.

October 14—Hubbersburg at Rebersburg; Loganton at Millheim.

October 21—Rebersburg at Millheim; Hubbersburg at Loganton.

October 28—East Penna Valley High at Hubbersburg; Loganton at Rebersburg.

November 4—Rebersburg at Hubbersburg; E. P. V. at Loganton.

Western Division

Sept. 30—Boalsburg at Spring Mills; State College at Centre Hall.

October 7—G. T. V. S. at State College; Centre Hall at Boalsburg.

October 14—Boalsburg at State College.

October 15—Centre Hall at Spring Mills.

October 21—G. T. V. S. at Boalsburg; Centre Hall at State College.

October 28—State College at Spring Mills; Boalsburg at Centre Hall.

November 4—G. T. V. S. at Centre Hall; State College at Boalsburg.

The point system will be used in determining the standing of each team in the league. Two points are scored for a victory and one point for each in case of a tie.

TWO DWELLINGS BURN.

A dwelling house at View and one at Pleasant Gap were destroyed by fire last week. The former took fire after the owner, John Puluse, and son Dewey left it to go to a corn field. They saw the flames from the field, but were unable to enter the house in time to save any of the contents or the building. Insurance in the sum of \$1500 was carried by the owner.

At Pleasant Gap a dwelling house owned by the White Rock Quarries and occupied by three families was entirely burned together with nearly all the furniture of the three families living in it.

The occupants were Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Herman, Mr. and Mrs. Hayes Zettle, and Mr. and Mrs. John Pletcher. The fire evidently followed an explosion in the section occupied by the Zettle family. All of the occupants escaped with difficulty, except Mr. Zettle, who had made fire in the kitchen stove and had gone some distance for additional fuel when the explosion occurred.

FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Prevent Rodent Injury—

At a cost of one cent a tree for poison bait orchards can be protected from damage by mice. Either wheat or rolled oats treated with strychnine is the bait most widely used. It is safer and more economical to prevent damage than to bridge-graft girdled trees.

Store Seeds Safely—

Store vegetable seeds saved from the home garden in a dry, cool room, away from mice and in sealed packages if possible, garden specialists of the Pennsylvania State College recommend. Dampness is especially damaging to the life of seeds.

Watch Tank Seams—

Undissolved particles of soap or washing powders sometimes compose the greater part of the scum at the outlet end of the septic tank. Occasionally this cum becomes 10 inches thick. Improving the management of the kitchen or laundry will remedy this trouble.

Keep Egg Cases Dry—

If a supply of used egg cases is purchased, it is important that they be stored in a dry, well-ventilated place above ground where dust will not collect on the cases and packing material.

Select Herd Boars—

If the boars for fall breeding have not been selected they should be obtained at once as the supply of good sires is limited. Tardy farmers may have to accept inferior animals.

Hens Need Water—

Laying hens need a constant supply of drinking water. They suffer more when deprived of water than if they run out of feed. Chickens refuse to drink their normal amount if the water is too cold.

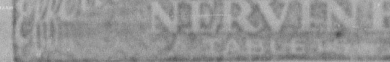
