Arrangements have been completed for a Democratic Rally at Philipsburg, on the evening of October 24th, 7:30 o'clock, in the Majestic Theatre. The speakers for the occasion will be Hon. Andrew L. Sommers, representative in congress from the 27th N. Y. district, a brilliant speaker; Lawrence Rupp, Democratic candidate for United States Senator from Pennsylvania, of Lehigh county; George Douglas, of Philadelphia; Edward C. Higbee, Democratic candidate for Judge of the Supreme Court, of Uniontown; G. H. McWhorter, Democratic candidate for Judge of the Superior Court, of Greensburg, Col. Frederick B. Kerr, Democratic candidate for Congress, and Robert J. Miller, Democratic candidate for general assembly, will also be present.

DEATHS.

CRAWFORD.—Edwin Wellington Crawford passed out of this life Sunday evening at 10:30 o'clock, following a paralytic stroke. He had been in delicate health for several years, but was able to be around, although not able to perform manual labor. His condition grew more critical as time went on, and for two weeks prior to his death he was unable to leave his bed. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon from the home in Centre Hall, with burial in the local cemetery. Rev. W. E. Smith, pastor of the local Evangelical church, and of which denomination he was a member, officiated at the burial service. Mr. Crawford was also a member of the local lodge of Odd Fellows and for many years served as treasurer of the organization.

The deceased was aged 73 years, 4 months and 20 days. He was a son of Benjamin and Charlotte Blerly Crawford, and was born in Madisonburg. He came with his parents from Coburn to Tusseyville in 1867, where he grew to manhood. In 1897 he and his half-brother, J. Frank Smith, former register of Centre county, located in Centre Hall and engaged in the general merchandising business, having purchased the store conducted for a short time by Rev. Potts, located in the Odenkirch store building, at Centre Hall railroad station. A few years later Mr. Crawford retired from the firm. For a number of years he was manager of the Centre Hall milk station when it was operated by Mr. Sheffer, of Dewart.

When a young man he engaged in teaching music—vocal and instrumental—and was a large factor in keeping the Colyer and Tusseyville bands on their feet at the time when bands were bands, and almost every cross-road in Centre county had such a musical organization. Musical conventions were also successfully conducted by him in many sections of this county.

He is survived by a wife, whose maiden name was Margaret Spangler, and two sons, George Alfred and Newton S., both at home. J. Frank Smith, of Bellefonte, is a half-brother of the deceased.

He was long an active member of the Evangelical church and Sunday school.

SLICK.—William S. Slick, former pastor of Centre Hall, died Sunday at 10:40 P. M., at Canfield, Ohio, from complications. He is survived by his wife, Lillian M. Kriss Slick, and the following children: Mrs. Bruce C. Auman, of Struthers, Ohio; Mrs. Elsie Wallace, of Jefferson, Ohio; and William A. Slick, of Canfield, Ohio. Also, by the following brothers: Samuel, of St. Clairsville; Thomas, of Altoona, and Abner, of Seward, all in this state.

Funeral services will be held this (Thursday) at 10 A. M. from the Goodhart funeral parlors; burial in the Centre Hall cemetery, Rev. J. M. Kirkpatrick to officiate.

McKAY—Mrs. Clara Elsie McKay, wife of the late George McKay, died at her home at 1924 West Venango, St. Philadelphia, of a complication of diseases. She was a daughter of the late W. H. Phillips and Catherine Furst Meyer Phillips and was born in Anaronsburg fifty years ago.

Surviving her are her mother, Mrs. Catherine Phillips, of Anaronsburg, and a daughter, Miss Florence McKay, of Philadelphia.

The body was interred in the Anaronsburg cemetery on Sunday, funeral services having been held from the home of the mother of the deceased.

EMERICK.—Harvey D. Emerick, who left Centre Hall something like forty years ago, died last week at Portland, Oregon at the age of about 71 years. After leaving here he engaged in various businesses and finally went to Texas where he prospered as a garage man. Later he returned to Oregon where he purchased a farm and engaged in cultivating it. His death was due to a stroke of paralysis, which affected his entire right side, after a few days suffering. Funeral services were held Saturday following, at Portland.

The deceased was a son of John and Mary Kraps Emerick, and was born on the Emerick homestead now owned by W. F. Fetterolf, east of Centre Hall. He is survived by his second wife and these children, born to the first union—Mrs. A. F. Paget, and Roy, of Portland, Oregon; and Charles, Salem, Oregon. Also, one sister, Mrs. Mary Price, of Antler, N. D., the only surviving member of that generation.

JAMESON.—R. W. Jameson, aged 76 years died in Lock Haven, Saturday morning. He was a former associate judge of Clinton county for two terms and county treasurer. He was also president of the Sugar Valley Fire Insurance Company.

COHEN STOCK SOLD AT BANKRUPT SALE FOR \$6500

The stock of merchandise carried by Cohen & Company, Bellefonte, was sold at bankrupt sale Tuesday afternoon, for \$6500, to Mr. Sapiro, a brother-in-law of Walter Cohen. The bidding began at \$2000, after which bids ranging from \$50 to \$200 came rapidly. As the bids swelled the total to near the final selling figure, the bidders lagged. Auctioneer Mayes refused a \$25 bid, holding the additional offers up to \$50.00.

At the close of the sale the purchase quickly stepped to the clerk and hurriedly counted out the cash in large denominations from a belt he carried on his person.

The goods had been appraised at about \$6,600, and this was sold to be about one-third their value.

CENTRE HALL; SPRING MILLS, ON COMMUNITY DAY

Centre Hall High broke a precedent of long standing when they defeated Gregg Township Vocational School in their annual Community Day soccer game. It was the first game ever lost by the Vocational boys on that particular occasion. The game was well played and closely contested, with the local boys having the advantage in passing. John Spzyker and Lawrence Hartley flashed fine form on the defense and Rossman was outstanding for the opponents.

Centre Hall entered a tie with Boalsburg for first place in the league standing by virtue of this victory, as Boalsburg was defeated by State College. This Friday the locals will go to State College, hoping to duplicate their victory of a month ago. Plenty of opposition is expected as they showed vast improvement by defeating Boalsburg 2 to 1.

MADISONBURG REF. CHURCH CELEBRATES 100th ANNIVERSARY

The Madisonburg Christ Reformed church, on Sunday, celebrated its one hundredth anniversary. The organization was effected in 1832, Sunday, October 16th, making the celebration of the event on the exact one hundredth anniversary. The present pastor is Rev. Arthur J. Miller.

The sermon at the regular morning service was delivered by Rev. Moses N. George, pastor from 1897 to 1900, and the afternoon service was of an historical nature and greetings from former pastors, with an address by Rev. James R. Brown, pastor from 1890 to 1897. Also, an address from Rev. Lucian Roush, a son of the congregation.

In the evening the sermon was by Rev. Frank Wetzel, pastor from 1899 to 1910. The former pastors are located at present as follows: Rev. George, at Punxsutawney; Rev. Brown, at Esterly; Rev. Wetzel, at Akron, Ohio; Rev. Roush is also located at Esterly.

DANIELS BLAMES "HOOVER PANIC" FOR CONDITION

Josephus Daniels, former Secretary of the Navy, in an address in Franklin, Indiana, said that Republican campaign strategists were trying to prove "an alibi" for what he termed the "Hoover panic."

"In their desperation as the campaign reaches the homestretch, the Republican orators, from Calvin Coolidge down to township spellbinders, are speaking overtime in the hectic attempt to prove they were not there when the Hoover panic prostrated agriculture, industry and commerce," said Daniels.

The former Secretary asserted "voters are asked to believe that this helplessness was in the night time bound hand and foot by marauding foreigners, who smuggled a foreign panic into this country, in spite of our high tariff walls guaranteed to keep out all ills."

Daniels charged "some more wanton spellbinders even go so far as to say smugglers were aided by wicked Democrats, who chortle with glee as they stand in the breadline in the hope that the Republican debacle will aid in securing a Democratic victory."

He added: "This panic would not have come to deny employment to 13,000,000 men anxious for jobs, except for the measures of governmental favoritism and immunities of the last 11 years."

The youth has been in delicate health for several years, is very much overweight, weighing 160 pounds, and is also backward in his school work. The Confer home is under quarantine, the effect of the quarantine being very similar to that of scarlet fever. Mr. Confer conveyed the school children on the Egg Hill route to the Pottery Mills schools, two of the Confer children being among these. Of course, this earning will denied him, as will also the privilege of attending school by his children.
