The week previous the board allocated \$2,000,000 of State money to the 67 counties of the State. The total grants Centre Hill, spent Friday at the Roy for all counties, both Federal and State, for December is \$4,303,760.

The Reconstruction Finance Corporation granted Pennsylvania \$1,531,090 for December relief. The difference between this amount and the money allocated on December 7th, is the unappropriated money from previous Federal grants.

The ten counties not sharing in the Federal relief money at this time are Adams. Butler, Chester, Delaware Lancaster, Lebanon, Montgomery, Pike, Sullivan and Wyoming.


