\$2,303,760 FOR FEDERAL RELIEF TO 57 COUNTIES

Centre county's share of the \$2,303,760 for Federal unemployment relief money, granted on the 7th inst., is \$10,945, and the total amount for December, \$17,800.

The week previous the board allocated \$2,000,000 of State money to the 67 counties of the State. The total grants for all counties, both Federal and State, for December is \$4,303,760.

The Reconstruction Finance Corporation granted Pennsylvania \$1,531,099 for December relief. The difference between this amount and the money allocated on December 7th, is the unappropriated money from previous Federal grants.

The ten counties not sharing in the Federal relief money at this time are Adams, Butler, Chester, Delaware, Lancaster, Lebanon, Montgomery, Pike, Sullivan and Wyoming.

HUNTING LICENSES NET STATE SUM OF \$1,095,025

Pennsylvania stood second only to New York in revenue from hunting licenses last year.

The Department of Agriculture noted that the State's coffers were swelled by \$1,095,025 from hunters during the year.

The number of licenses exceeded the number issued in both 1930 and 1929.

The State sold 530,392 resident and 6000 non-resident licenses.

Between eight and nine thousand licenses were issued this year from the office of the Centre county treasurer.

Col. W. Fred Reynolds, Wilson I. Fleming and Edward R. Owens have been named as appraisers to fix a price on the three properties selected as the site for the Bellefonte postoffice.
