CAMPAIGN ACCOUNTS OF DEMOCRATS FILED

Accounts filed by Democratic candidates in Centre county indicate no large sums spent. John L. Holmes, Republican, spent four times as much as did Robert J. Miller, the Democratic candidate. Neither of them received contributions. Miller's expenditures were \$191.13 and Holmes, \$751.58.

The Republican county chairman, R. P. Thompson, received \$1,311.00 and expended \$1,871.61, leaving a deficit of \$560.61, while Homer Barnes, treasurer of the Democratic county committee, closed his books with a balance on hand of \$59.84, out of a total fund of \$433.51.

The following contributed to the Democratic county fund: Sheriff John Boob, \$65; Prothonotary S. Claude Herr, \$50; Fred B. Kerr, \$130; Recorder D. A. McDowell, \$25; Register John Wetzer, \$50; William Noll, \$5; and Commissioner John Speary, \$10.

DEATHS.

GEISS—David Kerlin Geiss died in a Philadelphia hospital, Sunday morning, after a long illness. More than two years ago he suffered a paralytic stroke, and from that time his condition gradually grew worse. For months he was an invalid, requiring much care and attention, which was bestowed by his daughter, Mrs. A. Virginia Geiss Miller, 2011 Mt. Vernon Street, Philadelphia, with whom the aged father lived.

The body was shipped to Centre Hall by rail, arriving this (Thursday) morning, and later in the forenoon services will be held in the Goodhart funeral parlor, and interment made in the local cemetery, Rev. S. F. Greenhoe, pastor of the Lutheran church, to be the minister in charge.

Mr. Geiss had attained the advanced age of 93 years, 5 months and 27 days. He was born in Womelsdorf, Berks county, and at the age of twelve accompanied his parents, David B. and Sarah Kerlin Geiss, to Centre county, first locating at Stone Mill, in Potter township, the father operating the flouring mill for a number of years. When a young man the subject of this sketch married Miss Sarah C. Wagner. The couple engaged in farming on the Wagner farm, now tenanted by Clarence Miller, in Potter township. In 1870, the family moved to Centre Hall, Mr. Geiss having purchased the Colyer house, and lived there until after the death of Mrs. Geiss, in 1910, when he and his daughters, Miss Ethel E. and Mrs. Miller, located in Philadelphia.

Surviving the deceased is a son, D. Wagner Geiss, of Bellefonte, and Mrs. Miller, previously named, A. brother, Jacob K. Geiss, of Beloit, Kansas, ten years his junior, also survives him. While living in Centre Hall he engaged in the sale and erecting of lightning rods, a business then of importance. Later he became a dealer in cattle, as well as a shipper of them to eastern markets. He was long a member of the Lutheran church and in politics adhered to the principles of the Democratic party.

CARSON—William A. Carson died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John Breen, in Bellefonte, Friday morning, as the result of a complication of diseases. He is survived by his wife, formerly Ida Wagon, a daughter, Mrs. John Breen, of Bellefonte, and a son, James Carson, of Mt. Carmel. He is also survived by five sisters and a brother: Mrs. John Corman and Mrs. Benjamin Alkey, of Curtin; Mrs. Harry Lyons, Mrs. John Speary, Mrs. Walter Armstrong and Clark Carson, of Bellefonte.

He was a son of James and Margaret Armstrong Carson, and was born on the Bernard Wagner farm, near Centre Hill, long tenanted by his parents. He was a farmer by occupation and lived in various sections of Centre county during his active farm life. He was aged 67 years, 6 months and 12 days.

Funeral services were held at the Breen home Monday afternoon, in charge of Rev. Edgar R. Heckman; interment in the Union cemetery, Bellefonte.

SCHENCK—Mrs. Lucy Holter Schenck, who was aged 78 years, died Saturday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Harry Confer, in Howard, after a lingering illness of a complication of diseases. She was a native and lifelong resident of Howard. Two sons and seven other daughters survive: Foster and George, of Blanchard; Mrs. Melvin Schenck, Clearfield; Mrs. Thomas Fletcher, Mrs. Elbert Ties, Mrs. Earl Confer, Mrs. Albert Coder and Mrs. Howard Klime, all of Howard.
