**STATE GRANGE CONVENTION**  
ELECTS J. A. BOAK MASTER

Session Adjourned Friday — Recommends Subsidiary for Rural School Districts—Asks More Gas Tax Be Returned to Townships.

Returning to their farms, on Friday, delegates to the sixtieth convention of the Pennsylvania State Grange, in Williamsport, left their legislative committee to carry on their fight for Government economies and lower real estate taxes.

In addition to endorsing all the recommendations of the National Grange, the delegates recommended a school subsidiary for rural districts to prevent excessive taxation of land-owners.

They advocated return of 1 cent of the State gasoline tax to townships in proportion to unimproved road mileage, and a graduated or flat rate State income tax until the gasoline money can be made available. They reiterated their opposition to the diversion of gasoline tax money to any use except the improvement of the highway system.

National policies approved by the Pennsylvania State Grangers include: Independence for the Philippine Islands, tariffs on fats and oil, reduction of armaments, imposition of an allen tax, the return of a two-cent postage rate and a prohibition of the sale of armaments to foreign powers.

They also opposed a general Federal sales tax, establishment of a National Bureau of Education, cancellation of war debts and legalization of the sale of liquor.

The place of the 1932 convention will be decided later by the executive committee.

J. A. Boak, of New Castle, heads the Grange as State master, succeeding E. B. Dorsett, of Mansfield, Boak was installed Thursday night at the Grange's final convention session with other officers, who are:
