## FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

## Good Hens Make Profits—

Records kept on poultry flocks reveal that high egg production per hen is necessary to make profits. One flock averaging 168 eggs a hen made profits of 82 cents a bird, while a flock averaging only 71 eggs a hen lost \$2.21 a bird.

## Exhibit Dairy Cattle

Nearly 400 dairy cattle are on exhibit at the Pennsylvania Farm Show in Harrisburg this week, January 16 to 20. A feature of this show is 12 county herds and 11 4-H club groups containing animals of our breeds. There are 35 exhibitors from 14 counties in the open classes and 72 exhibitors from 10 counties in the 4-H club classes.

## Keep Ewes in Condition—

Breeding ewes need some form of succulence, such as corn silage, plenty of water, and sufficient exercise if they are to keep in the best condition. Unless early lambs are to be produced, grain need not be fed until later in the winter if there is plenty of good corn silage and legume hay available.

## Protect Evergreens—

Evergreens can be protected from winter injury by heavy mulches of straw litter or leaves. Rhododendron, mountain laurel, azaleas, and other broad-leaved evergreens should be mulched heavily with pine or hemlock needles, oak leaves, or well-decomposed hardwood sawdust.

## Select Good Vegetables—

Numerous new names of vegetables varieties appear in the 1933 seed catalogs. Many of these are improved selections of well-known varieties. In 91 extension demonstrations in the State last year varieties were compared for earliness, quality, and yield.

## Save Eggs from Freezing—

Eggs should be gathered frequently in cold weather and protected afterward to prevent freezing which injures quality.
