FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Needs Sweet Soil—

Sweet clover requires more lime than red clover and probably about as much as alfalfa. The crop also requires a well-drained soil, and the seed must be inoculated unless alfalfa has been grown on the field.

Work to Be Done—

Spring tasks that will make work for those who need it are repair of garden implements and such machinery as cultivators and lawn mowers, digging the garden, raking the lawn, fertilizing and reseeding the lawn, rolling the lawn, and many other types of work related to the renovation of the home grounds.

Grow Many Vegetables—

In planning the home garden, include liberal plantings of the root crops, such as beets, carrots, turnips, and onions; leafy crops, such as early and late cabbage, lettuce, spinach, and Swiss chard; and tomatoes, peas, beans, and sweet corn.

Market Eggs Often—

An egg cannot be improved by holding. Eggs should be shipped just as frequently as the method of marketing will permit. Whenever possible, make an effort to market eggs at least twice a week.

Show Maple Products—

Pennsylvania is gaining a place on the map of the maple industry. Exhibiting at farm shows informs the public as to the quality of these products and where they are grown.

Seek High Quality—

High quality milk delivered in good condition to milk plants or consumers and its manufacture into high quality products are worthy goals for the dairyman.

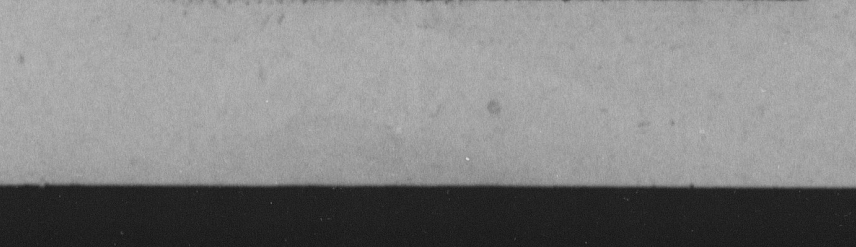
