**BANK ROBBER IS GIVEN TEN TO TWENTY YEARS**

Edward McHugh, of Mapleton Depot, who held up and robbed the First National bank in Mapleton Depot on December 16, 1932, of \$1,205, was sentenced Friday by Judge Thomas F. Bailey to the Western penitentiary to not less than ten years and not more than twenty years and pay the costs of the prosecution, restore the balance of the money stolen and pay a fine of \$100.00.  
When McHugh was first arrested he stated that he had done the job himself, but when he was brought to trial he involved the cashier, J. F. Mattern, as his accomplice, but the jury completely exonerated Mr. Mattern.

She had been in ill health for four years, but the cause of her death was the result of a paralytic stroke received the day previous.

**DECKER.**—John Wesley Decker, a native of Centre county, died at his home, in Altoona, following an illness of several months with complications. He was a son of John and Susan Brown Decker and was born in College township on October 20, 1862, hence was 70 years, 3 months and 23 days old. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Priscilla Decker, and four children—Miss Mabel, at home; George and Jacob Decker, and Mrs. Mary Meredith, all of Altoona; He also leaves four brothers, William Decker, of Altoona; Stewart, in New Jersey; Jonas, of Jersey Shore, and Thomas J., of State College.

Funeral services were held in the Rose Hill cemetery, Altoona.  
**WYCOFF.**—Mrs. Kate Wycoff, aged 71 years, widow of Dr. P. S. Wycoff, of Logan, died at her home Wednesday of last week after several years illness with a complication of diseases, which became acute only a week ago. She was born near York, but spent her girlhood in Canada, coming to Logan to reside after her marriage. Since her husband's death Mrs. Wycoff had resided for some time in Turbotville and State College, returning to Logan several years ago. She was a member of the Evangelical church at Logan. Surviving her are one son and one daughter: George S. Wycoff, of Chicago, and Dr. S. U. Wycoff, of Winnebago, Wis.; one brother, Henry Gertz, of York; three half-brothers and one half-sister. **DEATH COMES SUDDENLY TO SALVATION ARMY MAN**

Envoy Charles M. Saunders, who with Mrs. Saunders has campaigned this section of the State, including Centre Hall borough, for years in the interest of the Salvation Army, died suddenly at Bellefonte, Wednesday afternoon from a stroke of apoplexy. He was aged 51 years.  
Envoy Saunders, whose headquarters is at Scranton, had just recently completed a campaign at State College and had gone to Bellefonte, where he was arranging for a similar drive in that town, when he was stricken.

**CENTRE COUNTY CAME ACROSS WITH SHARE OF \$850,000 NAT'L CAMPAIGN DEFICIT**

Democrats over the entire nation are bending every effort to cancel the campaign debts of 1928 and 1932 prior to the inauguration of Franklin D. Roosevelt, on Saturday, and are on a fair way to do so. The hold-over deficit of former National campaigns is approximately \$850,000. This sum has been divided among the States; States cut their portions up for counties, and counties subdivide into smaller districts.  
At a meeting of the county executive committee held on Tuesday evening, members reported funds received were sufficient to cover the assessment of \$1000.00 for Centre county.

**COMMUNITY SALE GRAND SUCCESS; WILL REPEAT**

The community sale held at the Benner barn to the rear of this office, on Tuesday met the expectations of the promoters—Charles Wimer, State College, and J. W. Keller, Mc Alevy's Fort—experienced dealers. A fair day gave comfort to the large number of persons who attended the sale. The crowd remained until the auctioneer, E. M. Smith, announced the sale was closed, and H. L. Ebricht, clerk, had made the proper records.  
Wednesday morning checks were mailed to all creditors, the commission for selling having been deducted of course, all sales had been made for cash or approved checks.  
The gross amount of the sales was \$1664.80. The offerings covered a wide range and included 44 hogs, 16 sheep, 30 chickens, a few farming implements, hay, dog and rabbits, 21 cows, 11 young cattle, three horses and team of mules.  
The first offerings were handles for tools, made by H. J. Frantz, Altoona. His sales amounted to \$49.00.  
"Privilege secured by 'Cheap John' permitted him to run a sale of his own—he was auctioneer, clerk and receiver of cash. His offerings were in the line of dry goods, shoes, notions, etc.  
While no date has been set for a future sale, it is certain one will be held.
