FISH AND GAME ASSOCIATION
HOLDS INTERESTING MEETING

The regular meeting of the Spring Mills Fish and Game Association was held last Thursday evening. The following committees reported activities in their respective fields: Fish Committee—Reported that 189 cans of trout had been distributed during the past month; also, that placards representing the association are being prepared and will be placed on the local streams. Action was taken by the organization on legislation regarding Sunday fishing; license fee of \$1.00; use of gigs, nets and outlines. Dr. Thomas reported the nursery project coming along nicely. The federal inspector is expected beginning of April and consignment of small fish by the last of April.

Guy Corman of the Game Committee, reported that 18 bushels of feed was available for game; also, that the committee had made special application for ring-neck pheasants, rabbits and wild turkey. Game Protector Thomas Mosier stated that some birds would be available for stocking in a few days. Approximately 65 game-kill reports were given to Mr. Mosier by members of the club.

Every sportsman is invited to take part in the way of contribution for prizes and also marksmanship at a "shoot" to be held Thursday evening, March 23. 22-calibre rifles and pistols are to be used. Also, movies on "Forestry and its Protection" will be shown Tuesday, March 21.

The association is making a strong appeal for better protection of our game and fish. It hopes to be able to secure several deputies before the opening of the trout season.

Any sportsman interested in attending the Sportsman's banquet at State College, Friday evening, March 24, may secure tickets at Myer's Garage.

DEATHS.

STROHECKER—At the age of 72 years, 2 months and 21 days, William Harrison Strohecker passed out of this life on Thursday evening from an illness with Bright's disease and complications. His illness extended over a period of a number of weeks.
The body was interred in the local cemetery Monday forenoon, his pastor, Rev. D. R. Keener, officiating at the services.

Mr. Strohecker and Miss Mary Estelrline were united in marriage September 15, 1887, in Camden, New Jersey. Some time later Mr. Strohecker opened a general store in Boonville. From the old home surroundings he went to Lewisburg where he conducted a grocery store. From that college town the family went to another State College—where the head of the family made good investments and later sales in real estate. While in that place his sons entered as students in Penn State and graduated.

Seven years ago Mr. Strohecker and his good wife came to Centre Hall to make their home during their declining years. Business cares were cast aside.
Mr. Strohecker was a son of William and Nancy Blair Strohecker and was born in Boonville. He is survived by a wife, previously mentioned, and two sons—Clair E., engaged with the Bethlehem Steel Works, Bethlehem, and Roy E., with the Rob Roy Ice Company, Utica, N. Y.; also, a brother, John Strohecker, and sister, Mrs. Caroline Kleckner, both of Boonville.

He was long a member of the Reformed church and a teacher in the Sunday school.
CALLAHAN—After an illness from complications followed by pneumonia for a few days, Daniel Charles Callahan died at his home near Oak Hall Station, on Monday afternoon. The body was prepared for burial and then taken into the home of a daughter, Mrs. Green, at Linden Hall, from where burial will be made this (Thursday) afternoon in the cemetery at Centre Hall.

He was the son of John and Martha Cole and was born at Houserville on June 3rd, 1850, making his age 72 years, 9 months and 12 days. He was united in marriage to Miss Lillian Sprankle, who preceded him to the grave 24 years ago. Surviving are the following children: Lee and Harry, of Akron, Ohio; Mrs. A. M. Stoteman, of Lock Haven, and Mrs. Daniel Bohn, of Centre Hall. A brother, Jacob Cole, of Altoona, and these half-brothers and half-sisters also survive: Amos, of Lewistown; Frank, of Phillipsburg; Mrs. Harold Kirk, of Bellefonte, and Mrs. Rebecca Teuten, of Harrisburg.

He was an engineer by occupation and was employed at the American Limestone operations at Queens Run and Hayes Run. He enjoyed a wide circle of friends who join with the members of the family in their hour of bereavement.

BLAIR—Frank P. Blair, who for more than half a century conducted a jewelry store in Bellefonte, died at 6:45 o'clock Tuesday morning of last week, at the home of his son, Dr. H. A. Blair, at Curwensville. He was 82 years old.
Born in Bellefonte on April 21, 1850, a son of Attorney and Mrs. Wm. H. Blair, he lived all his life in Bellefonte with the exception of the few months spent in Curwensville. In 1875 he was united in marriage to Mary Entwisle, who died July 13, 1923. To this union three sons were born, Fred, now in Seattle, Wash., Dr. H. A. Blair, of Curwensville, and Russell R., of Bellefonte.

A staunch Democrat all his life, Mr. Blair was also a member of the Bellefonte Lodge of Masons for 52 years and served as Master of the lodge in 1884. He was a member of St. John's Episcopal church.
Interment was made at Bellefonte on Thursday.

ULRICH—Mrs. Daniel Ulrich, formerly of Millheim, but who has recently been living with her daughter, Mrs. Carrie Eitel, at Lock Haven, died at the latter place Wednesday morning of last week, probably of diseases incident to her advanced age.
