The Fishermen's dinner held last Friday night at Nittany Lion Inn, State College, was attended by H. F. Erdley, Dr. Thomas, Guy Cornman, J. B. Krape, D. G. Meyer, C. M. Watts, John W. Docker, and A. H. Hartwick. There were approximately 200 persons who sat down to the dinner.

Fish Commissioner O. M. Deibler devoted much of his interesting talk to the new trout hatchery to be established along Spring Creek, near Bellefonte. He predicted that the place would be visited by many prominent sportsmen. Work on the nursery will begin almost immediately.

By a vote of 152 to 2 a resolution was adopted asking Senator Scott and Representative Holmes to vote against Sunday fishing.

The board re-elected Charles E. Dorworth, of Bellefonte, president; Dr. S. C. Thomas, Spring Mills, and S. W. Gramley, Millheim, vice-presidents; and Dr. R. D. Anthony, State College, secretary-treasurer for the coming year. The county federation is planning an all-day outing, probably on Spring Creek, in late June or July, with various contests and other events of interest to sportsmen.

Preliminary steps were taken Monday night, in Grange hall, to organize a Tax League. Representatives were present from adjoining townships and Millheim borough, and at a future meeting it is proposed to organize permanently. Kyle Alexander, chairman of the county organization, County Treasurer H. F. Hutter, and County Commissioner Brungart were prominent among the speakers. There was no set program, but the occasion gave opportunity for a number of tax payers to give expression to their thoughts on taxation. Others who sat quiet entertained views less radical than were expressed on the floor by some speakers.

A demand was made for a four-mill road tax in Gregg. The supervisors had decided on five mills.

The local Fish and Game Association put on a "shoot" Thursday night in the Vocational school gym which was largely attended and is regarded as having been an entire success. The attendance was very large, scarcely permitting the freedom necessary for the thirteen riflemen to act in unison. Prizes were carried to various sections of the county. The success of the shoot is ascribed largely to the efforts of Gibson Neff, of Millheim, who prepared the gallery and conducted the affair.

The Groce Silk Mill shutdown was of short duration. The machinery was put in motion again on Tuesday, giving employment to the former employes and much to their delight.

A very interesting meeting was held by the members of the Grange at this place last Thursday evening. It was a get-together meeting of members of the several Granges in the county. There were about 100 members and visitors present. The purpose of the meeting was to get better acquainted and farm improvement.

Thomas C. Harrison, district forester of Millroy, called a meeting at this place last week at which he had the several rangers and assistant foresters present, and put on four reels of moving pictures, which were very interesting. All the while the pictures were being shown Miss Sarah Foreman entertained the audience with selections of piano music, which was enjoyed very much by all present. The Barber brothers also furnished guitar music. The purpose of the meeting was to organize fire fighting clubs for protection of our mountain timber.
