ADOLF HITLER DEFINES JEWISH RESTRICTIONS

The exact amount of Jewish blood which henceforth will serve to exclude Germans from official posts was clearly defined in a decree adopted by the cabinet of Adolf Hitler.

Twenty-five per cent. Jewish blood will be sufficient to classify the possessor as a member of the Jewish race.

Consequently, if one grandparent of an office-holder in the Reich was a Jew, the incumbent will be ousted as an undesirable.

The only Jews who will be allowed to remain in government service are those who were employed before the war, who served at the front of who lost fathers or sons in combat.

The new law applies equally to local and federal government posts.

ELIMINATE DAY OF ASSESSORS AT POLLS

Governor Pinchot on Friday approved the Scott bill, eliminating one of the two days on which assessors and registry assessors were required to sit at polling places.

He also approved the McClure bill permitting cities, counties, boroughs and townships to borrow money from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation for self-liquidating projects.

WORK WILL START ON U. S. ROAD SOON

Construction is expected to start soon upon a new Federal highway northward out of Middleburg.

It is a coincidence that the first Federal highway in Pennsylvania should be started in Snyder county, inasmuch as the first highway improvement under the Sproul act was also begun there.

The project will be a link in a thru highway that eventually will connect Buffalo and Washington, but will be a short cut from Canada to Florida.
