**MORE TROUBLE FOR  
POSTOFFICE EMPLOYEES**

Following close upon a flat 15 per  
cent reduction in the salaries of all  
postmasters as well as the pay of all  
postoffice employees, Representative

Dean, of Georgia, has introduced a bill  
in Congress providing for the dismissal  
of every mail carrier in the United  
States on July 1st, and to throw their  
jobs open to competitive bidding, the  
lowest bidder to get the job. Rural  
and village carriers would also be ousted  
and their work done by a contractor.

A provision in the bill would author-  
ize the Postmaster General to retain  
"such carriers as he finds it imprac-  
ticable immediately to replace," which  
would prevent all carriers from being  
thrown out at once and would make  
the change gradual enough to avoid  
confusion or disrupt the service.

Anyone would be permitted to submit  
bids for routes and the lowest ac-  
ceptable bidder would get the contract  
from the date of its consummation un-  
til the following June 30. No person  
would be permitted to bid on more than  
one route. The measure is now under  
consideration by the House committee  
on postoffices and roads.

It is estimated that the enactment  
of the bill into a law would mean a  
saving of approximately 20 per cent  
of the present cost of mail delivery  
and would wipe out a large portion of  
the annual deficit in the postoffice de-  
partment.

WITHIN TWELVE HOURS  
AT COBURN. BOTH STOVER**

Mrs. Beulah Stover died at Coburn  
at 7:55 P. M., Saturday, and her moth-  
er, Mrs. Anna K. Stover, also of Co-  
burn, passed away Sunday morning at  
3:55. The mother and daughter were  
laid to rest in adjoining graves on  
Tuesday forenoon, in Fairview cem-  
tery, Millheim. The funeral was very  
largely attended, the families on both  
sides having large connections in lower  
Penna Valley. The services were con-  
ducted by Rev. G. A. Fred Griesing,  
pastor of both ladies, in the Aaron-  
sbury Reformed church.

Mrs. Anna K. Stover was the wife of  
Lewis E. Stover, and a daughter of  
John and Kathryn Rote and was  
aged 65 years, 11 months and 19 days.  
She was married August 5, 1888, and  
the daughter whose death occurred the  
day previous was the only child. There  
survive her husband and these  
brothers and sisters: Andrew P. Rote  
and W. Harvey Rote, Spring Mills, and  
Mrs. J. W. Rachau and Mrs. David  
J. Vonada, Centre Hall, R. D. 2.

Mrs. Beulah Maude Stover was the  
wife of Martin A. Stover, and as stated  
above the only daughter of Lewis  
and Anna Katharine Rote Stover. She  
is survived by her father, husband  
and two children—Kermit, a student  
in Lock Haven State Teachers' Col-  
lege, and Myrtle, at home.

She was aged 41 years, 11 months  
and 5 days.

respectively, of the deceased ladies, is  
in a very critical physical condition,  
needing constant attention of attend-  
ants.

**BELLEFONTE LADY DIES OF  
AUTO INJURIES; 4 MORE HURT**

Mrs. Sara Greenburg, 59, of Belle-  
fonte, died early Monday in the Har-  
risburg hospital as the result of a col-  
lision near Newport in which six other  
persons were injured.

Seven-year-old Adella Mouri, Brook-  
lyn, N. Y., suffered a fractured skull  
in the crash Sunday night.

Mrs. Greenburg suffered a broken  
arm and leg. Both legs of her daugh-  
ter, Mrs. Henrietta Rosenblatt, 33, were  
broken. A broken leg was the injury  
received by Mrs. Rosenblatt's hus-  
band, Benjamin, 34, the driver, and  
their son, Arnold, 10.

Charles Mouri, Adella's father, and  
his son, Richard, 5, were treated at a  
Harrisburg hospital for slight injuries.  
The girl's other brother, Gregory, 9,  
escaped injury, although he was thrown  
to the road.

In the letting that was made by the  
school board of Penn township covering  
transportation of pupils to the Penn  
township consolidated school at Co-  
burn, Morris Bohn, the present holder  
of Route 1, was awarded a five-year  
contract for the same route at a rate  
of \$5.00 per school day. Routes Nos.  
2 and 3 were awarded to Lawrence  
Musser, of near Coburn—No. 2 being  
taken at a rate of \$3.50 per school  
day and No. 3 at \$4.00 per school day.  
It is said that Mr. Musser will assign  
the No. 3 route to Phillip Vonada,  
of Coburn. The new cost of transporta-  
tion, each contract being for a five-  
year period, amounts to about two  
dollars a day saving on each route.
